Famous Slave Case Recalled.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.—Mrs. C. Chaffee, aged 88 years, died at Springfield, Mass., last week, of old age. She was the widow of Dr. C. C. Chaffee and at one time was the owner of the slave Fred Scott, over whom the famous legal controversy was waged, and which practically annulled the Missouri compromise.

ACCIDENT TO SIR OLIVER MOWAT

Was Injured From a Fall at the Government House.

SUFFERS FROM CUT IN THE HEAD

It Is Doubtful Whether He Will Be Able to Open the Commencing Session.

Toronto, Feb. 15.—Sir Oliver Mowat is at present in a very precarious state of health as a result of a fall sustained about five weeks ago at Government House.

The lieutenant-governor, while walking in the halls, was overcome by a dizzy spell, and in falling his head struck against the hard tiling of the floor. A nasty gash was inflicted near the temple and a severe wrench was given the muscles of the body.

His head is now in his 82nd year. Grave doubts are entertained as to whether Sir Oliver will ever recover his strength sufficiently to again appear in public. It was stated yesterday by one of the Government officials that the lieutenant-governor would certainly be unable to open the coming session of the Legislature. In that case the duty will devolve upon Chief Justice Macdougall.

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TO STRENGTHEN BRITISH NAVY

The Admiralty Is Establishing Cruiser Divisions in All Parts of the World.

WIRELESS SYSTEM FOR UPPER LAKES

Stations To Be Established for the Purpose of Keeping in Touch With Vessels.

London, Feb. 16.—An important naval reform is being gradually accomplished by the British Admiralty. At the present time the British navy somewhat resembles a dismembered body. Some part of it floats in almost every sea, but in disjointed squadrons that are isolated from one another. The new system is designed to keep the various sections of the fleet in touch with one another by means of cruiser divisions. Already one has been formed in the Mediterranean, and the nucleus of another, of which the Good Hope is the flagship, is in commission.

The Australian, the China and the other British squadrons are also to have their light cavalry divisions, each under the command of a rear-admiral, as soon as these can be got together. It is intended that the cruiser divisions on the different stations shall not be always kept in the shadow of the commander-in-chief's flagship, but that they shall be in a chain, each with a link to the other. There will be constant intercommunication, and a combination of forces right from the channel to the furthest naval station, making in effect one big fleet instead of several smaller ones. Separate commands are to remain, but isolation will disappear.

On Lake Erie the American Dr. Lee de Forest is at present in Toronto. He stated that he had been summoned here by certain Toronto capitalists, whose names he declined to mention at present. The object of his visit is to install a temporary wireless telegraph apparatus for test purposes. This will be erected at the foot of York street during next week, and communication will be opened up immediately with Hamilton. If the results are satisfactory, and the young scientist sees no possibility of failure, a permanent station will be erected here primarily for the purpose of keeping in touch with vessels of the lake. As there will also be a station at Montreal, there is every likelihood that a commercial business will develop with the eastern metropolises as well.

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
