Chicago, July 23.-Ella Gingles, the roung Irish lace maker, who was acquitted of stealing lace and who told a sensational story of torture and C. P. R. Liner Makes the Fastest Trip "white slavery," may be deported, steps to that end being now considered. Miss Gingles protests strongly against being sent back to her native
