PARIS, Jan. 28.—6:05 p.m.—After having concentrated large forces between La Bassee and Festubert, says a Havas Agency dispatch from Saint Omer under date of January 25, the Germans attempted to break through the lines of the Allies in an effort to capture Bethune. The attack was commenced early in the morning, the infantry being supported by artillery and armored trains. Five attempts were made but they were all unsuccessful. The Germans even went as far as the church in Givenchy-les-La Bassec. Fierce bayonet fights, the dispatch continues, were incidents to the battle


