RETURNED MEN NOW
SCHEDULED TO BE
IN CITY WEDNESDAYSoldiers' Aid Will Look After
Their Welcome.

7 LONDONERS COMING

Windsor, Woodstock, Ford
and Guelph Soldiers Also in
Today's List.

Wednesday morning is the prospective date when the next draft of returned soldiers will arrive in this city. A large number of returned men, whose arrival at Quebec was announced Friday, are expected, but it will be some days before the Londoners amongst these will be sent home. All will have to go before a medical board, and until each one is examined none will be sent here.

The result of this examination will, in all probability, reduce the number to come somewhat. The men are divided into three classes, according to their injuries. Those in class I are given their immediate discharge without pension, and will not come here. Class II is comprised of the convalescents, which is generally the class sent to London. Class III will be sent here and given their discharge with a pension. London is the distributing centre for military district No. 1, so that many men whose towns are not given as London will arrive here.

The new branch of the soldiers' aid commission is taking charge of the welcome to the men who come next week, and Ed. Lance, late of the S. P. A., has made arrangements for the transportation of the men to the station.

BATTERY DRAFTS, 108
STRONG, LEAVE FOR EAST

Men of 63rd and 64th Depart From London This Afternoon.

This afternoon London once more witnessed the departure of men destined to continue their training at an eastern point.

Two officers and 108 men of the 63rd and 64th Depot Batteries entrained at the Grand Trunk.

A detail of 200 men from the 153rd Battalion was ordered out to line the approaches to the station and facilitate the unloading of the men.

Although the battalions have been in the city less than two months, they have won, by their clean, soldierly appearance, a place in the regard of Londoners that has seldom been attained by men in training here. Many expressions of regret were heard among citizens at the imminent departure of the men.

This is the first of three drafts to go from the battalions within the next two months. Two more have been asked for and Major Cameron and Major Walker are starting an energetic campaign to secure the needed recruits.

BUT ONE CITY CASE
INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Fewer Victims of Dread Disease This Summer Than for Many Years.

Dr. H. W. Hill, medical officer of health, reports that no new cases of infantile paralysis have developed in the city.

Only one case, and that almost recovered, has been brought to the attention of the health board this summer.

In view of the fact that the epidemic has been raging unchecked in several cities, the absence of the disease here is considered a most fortunate condition.

Almost every summer has seen more cases in the city than this year, and Dr. Hill believes that with continued vigilance on the part of parents, and that they report promptly all suspected cases, that the city will remain free from the dreaded scourge.

TO AID IN INQUIRIESCol. Shannon Promulgates Orders to
Simplify Requests.

Because of the number of inquiries made daily at district headquarters concerning members of the C. E. F., Col. L. W. Shannon, D. O. C., has promulgated the following in orders for the camp district headquarters:

The following instructions regarding inquiries concerning members of the Canadian expeditionary forces are published for general information, and are to be given full publicity:

1. Inquiries relating to casualties are to be made direct to records office, Ottawa.

2. Other inquiries or any applications for leave, transfer or otherwise, relating to members of the C. E. F. who have proceeded overseas must be made to Canadian Headquarters, Cleveland House, St. James' Square, London, England.

3. Any application or inquiry relating to a member of the C. E. F. in Canada must be made through the regular channels, i. e., to the officer commanding the unit to which the member of the C. E. F. belongs, who will deal with the member himself or forward it, after prompt investigation, with his recommendation, to the officer commanding military district in which the unit is situated.

4. Applications or inquiries concerning members of C. E. F. units in Canada, which cannot be made to an officer commanding a unit should be made to the officer commanding the military district concerned.

5. All officers commanding units in military district No. 1 are to distinctly understand that all inquiries or correspondence in this connection must receive immediate acknowledgment and prompt attention.

HARVEST APPLES NOW

APPEARING ON MARKET

Farmers Report That This Year's Crop Will Only Be an Average One.

Earlier varieties of apples are now beginning to make their appearance on the local market. The supply is fairly plentiful, although from indications, the crop promises to be only an average one. The majority of the varieties are suffering from scab, as conditions throughout the season have been most favorable for the development of this disease.

In many cases this is brought on by the failure of growers to take proper care of their trees. They require constant care. At the first of the year the wood should be sprayed with a solution of nine parts of lime sulphur to 40 gallons of water. A second spray of equal amount of commercial lime sulphur and 40 gallons of water and three pounds of arsenic of lead should be used when the blossoms are opening. The trees should be sprayed again with the same mixture just after the petals have fallen.

A summer spray, made of one gallon of Bordeaux mixture to 30 gallons of water is the last thing required. Pruning should be done in the summer or at other times when the sap is dormant.

ASKING FOR GIFTS

WORKING FOR INFANTS

Members Are Already Making
Up Clothes for
Babies.

The executive of the club feels assured the response to the request will be hearty and prompt on the part of the women of London, whose sympathies have been much aroused for the sufferers. Though a brief preliminary announcement only appeared this morning, a few hours after the president of the Women's Canadian Club, while riding in a street car, was asked by a woman fellow-passenger where clothing might be left.

All parcels left at Wesley Hall (the Sunday school of the First Methodist Church) should be marked "New Ontario."

FLOUR PRICES ARE
AGAIN UP 60C CWT.Increase in Wheat Quotations Have
Brought About Sudden Rise.

Flour prices are soaring. Within the past two weeks flour has risen over 60 cents to the hundredweight. Western flour has risen 80 cents to the hundredweight. This is due to the sudden increase in the price of wheat caused by the American Government report on crop conditions. Prices have been going up steadily, and in some instances at 10 cents a jump.

"It is merely a gamble," one of the flour and feed dealers in the city stated to The Advertiser this morning. "It is not likely to last long, and will probably go down with a crash." Other commodities of the flour and feed business have been mainly responsible for the increase, and only the manipulation of the market has kept the prices going up.

For this reason it is thought that individuals will not be affected. Local bakers have at present a large enough supply of flour to last over until prices are again normal. SEAPLANES INJURE SEVEN;
BREAK WINDOWS AT DOVERFour Bombs Dropped by Germans, But
Little Damage Done.

London, Aug. 12.—3:45 p.m.—An air raid on the British naval port of Dover by two German seaplanes occurred this afternoon. An official statement says four bombs were dropped, one officer and six men being slightly injured, but little material damage being done.

"Two hostile seaplanes," the statement reads, "appeared over Dover this afternoon. Four bombs were dropped, but no material damage was done beyond the breaking of a few windows. Anti-aircraft guns came into action and aeroplanes went in pursuit of the raiders, who made off seawards. The seaplanes were one officer and six men slightly injured."

EIGHT GERMAN PRINCES
KILLED IN THE FIGHTINGBut None of the Kaiser's Brood Figure
on the List.

(London, Aug. 12.—A Daily Chronicle dispatch from Paris says: The latest edition of the Almanach de Gotha records eight German princes killed since the beginning of the war, namely:

Two princes of Saxe-Meiningen, three of Lippe, one of Hesse, one of Reuss, and one of Waldeck. A prince of the ducal house of Lichensien died from wounds received at the front.

The Almanach notes the morganatic marriage of the Kaiser's fifth son, Oscar, with Countess Raskevitz, who was made Countess Ruppin.

The Prince of Wied does not figure in the section devoted to reigning families. He is mentioned as "His Highness Prince of Albania."

The Almanach also says: The German overseas colonies are said to be under the provisional administration of the French and British.

TO ENTER EXHIBIT

Mount Brydges Improvement Association
Will Show at Stratford Fair.

At a meeting of the Mount Brydges Junior Farmers' Improvement Association Friday night it was decided that an exhibition would be entered at the Stratford Fair. This will really be in competition with the exhibit which is being entered by the Stratford Junior Farmers. It was also decided that the association would provide the entertainment at the fair held in Mount Brydges.

Committees were appointed to make more complete arrangements and each member of the association was asked to contribute something toward the exhibit. A special meeting will be held next Friday, when the committee will lay its plans before the other members.

A DESTRUCTIVE RAID.

Paris, Aug. 12.—The great damage inflicted by the recent Italian aerial raid near Trieste is related in a semi-official note issued at Rome, as forwarded by the Havas agency. It says that 20 machines dropped four tons of explosives, blowing up a great petroleum refinery, the Gulf of Trieste and destroying all nearby buildings. Three buildings of a torpedo factory, containing a large amount of valuable machinery, were wrecked.

The Austrians responded with their raid on Venice, in which the church of Santa Maria Formosa was reduced to ruins. No military damage was done.

RUSSIANS MOVING
TO TURN FLANKS
OF VON BOTHMERAustrians Falling Back Closely
Pursued by the
Slavs.

(Canadian Press.)
Petrograd, Aug. 12.—Via London, 4:45 p.m.—Following the capture of the important railway junction of Stanislav, Galicia, General Letchitzky is pressing with unabated vigor the movement to turn the right flank of the army of Gen. Von Bothmer. Halicz, 16 miles north of Stanislav, appears likely to fall before the Russians in the near future.

The Austrians are falling back on this point, pursued closely by Russian cavalry, which is giving the Teutonic forces no time to reform their lines and prepare to make a serious stand.

The Key To Lemberg.
Halicz always has been regarded as the key to Lemberg. Once the Russians are in possession of that town they will have before them no natural obstacles, and will have plenty of good roads to Lemberg.

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THINKS WILSON FEARS
ATTACK FROM THE EAST

(Canadian Press.)

London, Aug. 12.—The Nation this week calls attention to the hitherto little-noticed clause in Premier Asquith's speech of August 4, in which he referred to the safeguards against war as resting on the common will of Europe, but "not of Europe alone." The Nation asks whether this is a reply to President Wilson's speech of May 27, and an invitation to America to pursue a policy of guarantees—and if so, hopes that Foreign Minister Grey will expand it into a reasoned exposition of policy.

The Nation takes the view that America is anxious to mediate because she fears Europe is ruining herself and against a weakened Europe she dreads the advent of a great far eastern power.

ORDER-IN-COUNCIL
MISSING FROM FILE;
CONTRACT VANDER
EXECUTIVE CLERK ON STAND IN
TRIAL OF EX-CABINET
MINISTERS.

Winnipeg, Aug. 12.—George Winters, assistant clerk of the executive council, was the first witness called this morning by the crown in the ex-ministers' trial. He was asked to identify the signatures to the orders-in-council, which the defence admitted. "We do not admit, however," said A. J. Andrus for the defence, "that the orders-in-council correctly state who were present at the meeting."

Winters said he had been unable to find in his files a copy of order-in-council 2347, which authorized the \$802,000 dome contract, authorized the order produced from the minister's file. The defence objected to evidence being accepted as to the alleged disappearance of an entry relating to this order from the record book, and were sustained by the judge.

Montague Got Contract.
C. H. Danciel, deputy minister of public works, was the next witness. He said Dr. Montague took \$125,000 from the 1915 estimates for the Parliament Buildings and added that amount to the estimates for the tunnel connecting with the power house. When Kelly's original tender was accepted, Caldwell told witness to return Kelly's marked check for \$142,000 and accept him for the \$392,000 contract, which he got from the filing clerk, and gave to the minister and never saw it again. He also gave Montague the public works department copy of the order-in-council authorizing this contract, and Montague destroyed it in his presence.

SHIPBUILDERS OF DUTCH
LOSING IMMENSE TRADEBusiness Going to America Because of
Ship Export Law.

Rotterdam, Netherlands, July 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Many foreign shipbuilding orders that would have gone to America, in consequence of the uncertainty created by the Dutch Parliament, according to a complaint just presented to the minister of agriculture, industry and commerce by a shipbroker, A. Schippers, who represents large shipbuilding interests.

"It is," he says, "remarkable that America has never been able to compete with Dutch shipbuilders, neither before nor during the war, but that so now as Holland was closed to the export of ships the United States has booked big orders for the building of vessels for European firms, at prices that are fabulously high—much higher than the prices which our shipbuilders would ask if there were a free export of ships built in this country."

The Dutch shipbuilding industry cannot exist without foreign orders, and the livelihood of 16,000 workmen is at stake, according to the petitioner. His points out that while on December 31, 1914, less than 10 per cent of the tonnage building here was being constructed to foreign orders, this proportion had risen on June 1, 1915, to about 31 per cent.

Northern Ontario Fire Relief

The Northern Ontario Fire Relief Committee, consisting of representatives of the Dominion and Ontario Governments, City of Toronto, Ontario Associated Boards of Trade, Toronto Board of Trade, and Canadian Manufacturers' Association, has been formed at the request of the Ontario Government to solicit and administer funds for the immediate relief of fire sufferers. The Dominion and Ontario Governments have each subscribed One Hundred Thousand Dollars, and the City of Toronto Fifty Thousand. It is estimated that at least Four Hundred Thousand Dollars is needed to effectively relieve the situation, which is very serious. Citizens are urged not to make contributions through other than the Toronto central organization, in order that duplication and waste may be avoided.
