

Last Year's Men Not Available for Present Work.

Training in the city assessment department is evidently valuable to the persons receiving it. Every year it is necessary to engage six temporary helpers about this time of the year. Assessment Commissioner Grant accordingly got busy a day or two ago in an endeavor to sign up the men who had assisted last year. He found, however, that every one of them had secured good permanent positions after leaving the city's employment. Applications for the position are meanwhile being presented, and a selection will be made from these.

For instance, the returns from bonds and various other investments cannot be estimated.
