WOMEN SEIZED
BY 'HUGGERS' IN
SOUTH LONDONThree Cases Alleged To Have
Been Reported in Week
to Police.

DISTRICT TERRORIZED

The women of London South have been terrorized for the past week by two "Jack the Huggers" to such an extent that a number of them will not step outside the house unless accompanied by a male member of the family.

Three cases, it is claimed, have already been reported to the police, and it is said by residents of the district that plainclothes officers are now on duty in the southern section of the city.

On Tuesday night a woman living on Carrae Crescent was seized shortly after dusk by a man, who released his hold only after she had scratched his face.

This attack took place in the neighborhood of the old Traction bridge. "I did not report the matter to the police, fearing publicity," said the lady in speaking of her experience to The Advertiser Monday afternoon. "The next day, a doctor's wife was subjected to the same treatment, and I understand that the doctor reported the matter to the police. I would know the man again if I saw him, and when I do, publicity or no publicity, I am going to send for the police."

Two little girls, living near here, were also picked up by an old man last Thursday. One of them screamed, and a man passing by on a bicycle interfered. It is a terrible thing and should be stopped. I am almost afraid to go down town. Don't you dare put my name in the paper. It has never been in the newspaper before, and I don't want it to be now."

On Thursday night the same thing happened on Elmwood avenue, close to Grand avenue. A passing taxi driver saw two women struggling on the sidewalk with a man, and turned back. He succeeded in knocking the man down and carried him to his taxi, hoping to get him to the police station. However, the man made his escape, although the driver states that he will know him again when he sees him.

A purse-snatcher believed to be an Italian, tried his luck on the handbag of Mrs. Charles Singleton, Gerrard street, Friday evening in the vicinity of the traction bridge, but was foiled in the attempt.

As the man, who is described as being dark and stout, with a foreign accent, attempted to seize the purse, Mrs. Singleton quickly transferred it to the other hand and told her little girl to run back to the corner and get the policeman who was standing there. The would-be thief hurried to a nearby bicycle and made a getaway.

CAPE BRETON IS
VISITED BY STORMDamage Results From Worst
Gale Since 1873.

Sydney, N. S., Oct. 30.—By Canadian Press.—An unknown three-masted schooner is ashore in Mira Bay, two small steamers were wrecked, and a great variety of minor damages resulted from the worst gale Cape Breton has experienced since 1873, which began here Friday afternoon and reached its height Saturday morning. The wind blew with fury up the length of the harbor, pitching such a sea that the waves broke completely over the wharves at Westmont, opposite the city, and nearly ten miles from the harbor mouth.

Telephone lines were down in all directions, and interurban tram service was seriously affected. At Glace Bay the spire of the Baptist Church was blown down, and crashed through the roof of the building. The wind also took the roof off the parish hall.

At North Sydney the force of the waves carried away a portion of Queen street, while the wharf of the Cape Breton Electric Company was badly damaged. Numerous small craft along the waterfront sank, or were washed ashore.

2 SHOT IN BANK
ROBBERY IN N. Y.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Two men were shot, one probably fatally, and \$5,000 was stolen from the Niagara Falls Trust Company's bank at Falls and First streets at noon today by hold-up men armed with shotguns.

BOMB OUTRAGE IN HOME
OF HAVANA ARCHITECT

Havana, Oct. 31.—Considerable property damage was caused by the explosion of a bomb in the home of Fernando Gonzalez, an architect, in a fashionable residential section of this city early this morning. The police were today investigating the explosion, and prepared to believe it might be connected with threats by radicals against Major-General Enoch H. Crowder and the United States legation here.

Alexander Closely Guarded as
Slav Anarchists Hover Around

Paris, Oct. 30.—King Alexander, who accepted the crown of Yugoslavia, has been in doubt for two months, started the return trip to Belgrade early last night. Special efforts were made to keep his departure secret. The French foreign office being notified only a few minutes before the train left. Alexander expressed annoyance at the display of police at the Gare de Lyons, where he boarded the train, but the police measures appeared to be justified, as two suspicious-looking persons, listed on the train as "dangerous anarchists," were caught hovering about the station platform. They were detained until after the train departed.

RAILMEN AGAIN
TALKING STRIKE1,500,000 U. S. Employees
Prepare To Resist New
Working Rules.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—Developments Sunday indicated "war clouds" on the railroads supposed to have been vanishing with the recall of the strike of the "Big Five" brotherhoods are thickening.

B. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, announced the railroad unions outside of the brotherhoods, representing more than 1,500,000 railroad workers, are perfecting their strike machinery in preparation for a strike in protest against the working rules they deem unjust.

Can Act Quickly.
The union executives have been authorized to act without a strike vote if they feel delay might hinder their program. They await further decisions from the labor board.

Facts disclosed that the "Big Five" brotherhood chiefs were already forced to withdraw their order brought admissions from labor leaders that the United States labor board, though created under a law without teeth, has demonstrated its power to prevent strikes.

They declared it a "startling revelation" that, although anti-strike provisions were carefully kept out of the law, the board, with the "iron hand" of the United States Government behind it, can operate, in effect, exactly as if it were created to enforce anti-strike legislation.

To Intensify Danger.
They predicted that when the full effect of the board's action in the brotherhoods' case becomes known to the rank and file of the railroad workers, an already dangerous situation will be intensified.

They further forecast a wage cut program by the board that will work to prevent united strike action by destroying the co-operation of the American Federation of Labor unions and those of the "Big Five."

The "iron arm law of the law" moved beneath the conciliatory efforts of the labor board to avert the brotherhoods' strike, it came out.

How Iron Arm Worked.
The "Big Five" chiefs received until 6 o'clock Thursday night to withdraw the strike call. The order prepared by the board was read to them, declaring law violators and conspirators who had inflamed their men to strike against a decision of the board.

They were warned, it was learned, that they faced jail and prosecution by the United States Government, unless they take a final vote by 5 o'clock. The brotherhood executives begged the board for time to hold a night session, it was disclosed. They went into the night session with the warning that only one thing—recall of the strike order—could save them from arrest the next day.

The recall of the strike followed.

D'AOSTA MAMY BE KING.
Prague, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 31.—Rumors are current here that the Duke D'Aosta, cousin of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy, will be proposed as a candidate for the Hungarian throne.

To Be Battleground of ElectionFIGHT IN EVERY
RIDING LOOMS
A POSSIBILITYAt Least Two Candidates in
Almost All Constituencies.

MANY TRIPLE CONTESTS

Statistics Indicate Struggle
For Majority of 235
Dominion Seats.

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—With the official nomination day still three weeks away, the interest everywhere taken and the nature of the fight to be waged in the coming general election, is shown by the array of candidates of all three parties as well as independents and Labor men, who have been chosen by party conventions and have accepted nominations. Of the 235 seats there are practically no constituencies where at least one candidate has not already been chosen and announced that he will stand for election.

That Ontario will be the main fighting ground is evident from the fact that in the 82 constituencies practically all have two or three candidates named, and some have four.

Quebec, according to the same dispatches, has practically its full quota of 65 Liberal candidates already named. There is only an occasional constituency formerly represented by a Liberal which has not been taken by a Liberal candidate. In this regard, there are fewer changes in Quebec than in any other province.

Twenty government candidates have been nominated in Quebec to date, four Progressives and half a dozen who have announced that they will run as independents.

For the 16 Nova Scotia seats, there are 16 Liberals nominated, 14 Government supporters, 5 Progressives and 2 Labor candidates.

New Brunswick, with 11 members to elect, already has 8 Government supporters, 7 Liberals and 3 Progressives in the field.

Manitoba, which elects fifteen members to the House, has 9 Government supporters, 5 Liberals, 10 Progressives and 3 who are running under the title of Independent.

Eight British Columbia seats, has 12 Government supporters, 13 Liberals, 2 Progressives and 3 Independents in the field.

Prince Edward Island has four each of Government and Liberal candidates, 1 Progressive and 1 Independent.

Saskatchewan, with sixteen seats, has eight Government supporters, 6 Liberals, 11 Progressives already in the field.

Alberta, with twelve seats, has 8 Government supporters, 4 Liberals, 6 Progressives and 4 Independents.

Yukon Territory, which returns one member, has both a Liberal and a Government supporter in the field.

In the foregoing list Labor men and Independents are grouped.

LONDON DOCTORS
ATTEND CONGRESSDemonstration of Eye Sur-
gery at Clinic in Phila-
delphia.

Seven local medical men attended the clinical congress of American surgeons, held in Philadelphia, last week.

Dr. John G. Hunt, eye and ear specialist, stated that there were more than three thousand medical men from Canada and the United States present. There were also representatives from England, Germany and Austria.

Prof. Fuchs, one of the most outstanding men in his profession, gave some wonderful demonstrations on eye surgery.

Chevalier Jackson of Philadelphia, a pioneer in this continent operated into the lungs, or foreign bodies stuck in the esophagus, such as safety pins, coins, etc., explained his technique for the removal of same. He stated that 95 per cent of the cases now recover through the new methods of operating, whereas formerly such cases were considered fatal.

25 INJURED IN

Montreal, Oct. 31.—Two street cars, both traveling at a high rate of speed, collided early this morning on the St. Denis line, near the Back River, resulting in more than a score of people being seriously injured. Both cars were totally wrecked.

Col. Hutchison, general manager of the Montreal Tramway Company, which operates the street cars, stated that twenty-five people had been treated for injuries received in the collision. Most of the passengers were hit by flying glass or were suffering from shock.

DEATH CALLS
MRS. FOWLERSister-in-Law of Lord Wol-
verhampton Passes at
Home Here.

After a brief illness, Mrs. Robert Fowler, for more than thirty years a resident of London, passed peacefully away Sunday at noon at her late residence, Victoria Apartments, Queen's avenue.

Ten days ago, she celebrated her birthday, many friends calling to extend their congratulations and good wishes. She appeared bright and in good health as usual, but from that time gradually lost strength until the end came yesterday.

With her at the last was her only daughter, May L., a son, Joseph, a prominent lawyer of Sudbury, Ont., arriving at noon today for the funeral, which takes place privately tomorrow.

Mrs. Fowler was a descendant of prominent United Empire Loyalist stock, the daughter of the late Dr. Austin and Mrs. Austin of Picton, Ontario.

Active in Church Circles.
She was a sister-in-law of Lord Wolverhampton of Wolverhampton, England, whose daughter, Ellen Thorneycroft Fowler, is the well-known English authoress.

Taking a deep interest in church and welfare work, Mrs. Fowler devoted her ability and energy especially to the activities of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church. For years, she rendered most effective service as first vice-president of the London Conference Branch Women's Missionary Society, and until the time of her death was the honorary president.

She was also honorary president of the First Methodist Church, W. M. S. Auxiliary, of which she was for ten years the president.

Received Highest Honor.
In years past, the highest honor in the gift of the conference branch was again and again bestowed upon her, that of being appointed a representative on the Dominion board of the W. M. S.

Officers of the London Conference Branch of the W. M. S., of which Mrs. Gordon Wright is president today, paid this tribute to the honorary president, whose passing has brought to them genuine sorrow and loss.

"Mrs. Fowler's outstanding success as a leader was due, not so much to executive ability, as to her wonderful sweetness of spirit and the charm of her Christian character."

HIGHWAYS DEPARTMENT
ORDERS SIGNS REMOVED?Retail Merchants Object—Have Thou-
sands Invested.

A meeting of the executive of the Ontario Retail Merchants Association will be held in the city of Toronto on Thursday and Friday of this week. Wilfrid Hodgins of London, second vice-president of the association, will put before the meeting the question of the removal of advertising signs along the Government highways.

Certain indications from the Ontario Department of Highways have shown that the removal of signs along the roads and in farmers' fields which border on the highways, may be ordered by that department. In view of this fact retail merchants, who have thousands of dollars invested in sign advertising, will go into the matter and inquire into the constitutionality of such orders.

P. Glen, of Glen Bros., of this city, said that attempts have been made in the past to remove advertisements of dollars involved in sign advertising, such signs are a disgraceful. All such endeavors had proved abortive, however.

DOWNFALL OF LENINE
EXPECTED SHORTLY

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—Collapse of the Bolshevik regime in Russia, with its attendant increase of European trade, is confidently expected within the next two months, according to Alphonse Pressat, a prominent diamond merchant of Antwerp, Belgium, who arrived in Ottawa over the week-end.

Mr. Pressat stated that information on the conditions in Russia was being received from two sources, according to him, that the country were unanimous in their opinion that the downfall of Lenin and Trotsky would take place soon.

ORDERS 3-TON
LOAD IN CITY
HALL MOVEDBuilding Inspector Piper
Seeks To Make Structure
Safe for Employees.

ALD. WILSON ALARMED

Declares City Clerk's State-
ments Regarding Building's
Condition "Not All Bunk."

Building Inspector Piper and Ald. W. A. and J. C. Wilson were in City Clerk Baker's office Monday morning looking over the condition of the structure, which is scheduled to crash in at any moment. It was then decided, according to the city clerk, that Mr. Piper should notify the Soldiers' Aid Commission to immediately shift the three-ton load which they have in the offices directly above the clerk's quarters. Failure to obey the order will mean that the council will be asked to deal with the situation.

Ald. Cameron Wilson stated that since he has been a member of the council—he is on his second term—a resolution had been passed by the council limiting the number of persons in the committee has charge of city properties, and under whose jurisdiction the care of the city hall comes, remarked that "it's not all bunk about the dangerous condition of the hall. We did pass a resolution last year limiting the number of people who might gather in the council chamber, because the place was shaky. That resolution should have been placed in the council minutes."

Mr. Wilson was not sure whether the resolution followed a report from the building inspector or not. Nevertheless, he is satisfied that the civic structure is in a dangerous condition. A similar resolution was passed in 1917 following a report from Mr. Piper, the building inspector.

Mr. Vance concluded his address with the expressed hope that Canada and the United States as nations would ever be drawn closer together.

Those who are entitled to vote and are not on the 1921 municipal list or part of 3 of that list must register if they wish to vote on Dec. 6 next.

COUNTY PUPILS MAY
PAY 80 PER CENTSecretary Tanner Predicts
Question of Charge To
Be Settled Soon.

Secretary W. A. Tanner of the board of education believes that the matter of charging the county for the education of county pupils at the local high and technical schools will be settled sometime this week. The basis of the settlement, he believes, will be that the county will pay the local board 80 per cent of the actual cost for educating each pupil.

Such a basis would mean that the citizens of London will contribute 20 per cent of the cost of educating county pupils.

The board of education will meet on Tuesday, but it is not the intention to consider the above question then. The agenda calls for the dealing with a list of routine matters, including a number of applications for positions as janitor in different schools.

MAN KILLED BY SHOT
INTENDED FOR MOOSE

Hampton, N. B., Oct. 31.—George A. Kennedy of Passakeag, King's County, was shot and killed on Friday afternoon, Oct. 29, supposedly by a bullet from the rifle of John Davidson, a mistake for a moose, which was seen in the vicinity where the men were hunting, according to a verdict rendered by a coroner's jury on Saturday.

Kennedy left his home between 2 and 3 o'clock on Friday afternoon on a hunting trip. He did not return, and search parties found his body about one mile from the main road with a rifle bullet through his chest.
