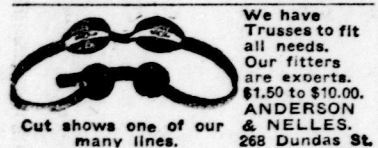


FAVORS RICHMOND ST. AS LONDON'S GATEWAY

Speaking at the ratepayers' meeting at the Wortley Road school house on Monday evening, W. I. Spettigue, candidate for alderman in ward one, referred to the need of making Richmond street the gateway to London from the south. The talk of building a bridge at Eldon street to cost \$155,000 was wrong, he declared, as attention should be paid to Richmond street. Mr. Spettigue also favored immediate action in dealing with repairs to Wellington street, claiming that work there had been held up for various reasons, at one time car tracks, and again sewers being laid for the delay.

CHARGES JANITOR TREATED UNFAIR

Richard Ready Declares the
Teachers Lead Him Hard
Life.

That a returned soldier, the janitor of the Tecumseh avenue school, is not receiving a square deal, is the contention of Richard Ready, who after a recent visit to that institution, asserts that he was greatly surprised when he learned the true conditions there.

Mr. Ready declares that this man is practically doing the work of two men. He attends two boilers, he says, cleans both fires and has to carry the ashes in a box to the yard, where he places them in a barrow and wheels them to a field. In addition to other work, Mr. Ready explains, the janitor has his room to care for. His work requires him, it is stated, to be more or less busy from 5:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. each weekday, while he has certain duties to attend to on Sundays as well.

Mr. Ready claims further that both the principal and the teachers of this school are making it unpleasant for the janitor in a deliberate effort, he claims, to get rid of him.

In an effort to have conditions, which he terms as intolerable, improved, Mr. Ready informed The Advertiser on Tuesday afternoon to the above effect. He is ready to explain further to combat contradiction.

GIVES ORGAN RECITAL IN ADELAIDE ST. CHURCH

Assisted by Mr. Carmen Learn, harpist, and the Elgar Ladies' Quartet, Mr. O. Leo Herbert, organist and choir-master, gave a much-enjoyed organ recital on Tuesday evening in the Adelaide Street Baptist Church.

Technical finish, clean pedaling, clearness and fine sense of rhythm marked the playing of the recitalists, these qualities especially apparent in the First Sonata in F Minor for organ by Mendelssohn, with its difficult last movement, demanding expert pedaling, and the overture to Euryanthe (Webers). Excellent orchestral effects were achieved on a small organ in the sonata and overture.

A group of numbers by old classical composers included the work of West-

ley, Martini and Louis Nicolas Clerambault.

Mr. Learn afforded a treat in the singing of "A Memory" (Thomas), "My Ships Went A-Sailing," and "You Love the Time of Violets" (Lohr).

The Elgar Ladies' Quartet, always an entertaining feature of a concert, gave "The Rosary" and "Resignation."

HEARD SAME OLD STORY MANY TIMES

Nelson Street Resident Shocks
Board of Works With
Request.

Jack Mansell, a resident of Nelson street, near Wellington, kind of shook up the Board of Works on Tuesday night, when he appeared before that body, for what he intimated was the seventh time, asking that the pile of ashes, a thousand loads, more or less, placed at his door by the city, be moved.

"The Board of Works will look into the matter. We're a pretty fair body for getting things done," said the chairman, W. A. Wilson.

"If I hadn't been here so often before and heard that same old story, I might believe it was all right," shot back Mansell.

Mansell told the committee that every time he had appeared he had been told that the ash pile would be moved. Prior to the dumping of the ashes along the river bank, it was a beautiful green spot. When he complained some of the ashes were moved, but those in front of his door were left.

City Clerk Baker said it was the first he heard of the complaint, and the engineer said it was the first mention made of the ashes.

"Oh, no," said Mr. Mansell. "You forget all about it, but the complaints were made, nevertheless."

Ald. Ashton made some remark and Mansell replied: "I spoke to you several times and you said it would be all right, the engineer would fix it. The same old hot air."

The engineer will look into the matter, and Ald. Brighton, in whose ward the pile is, said he would also visit it. Ald. Wilson said the committee looking into the gasoline tank question could not report as it was waiting on further advice from the city solicitor. An applicant for permission to install a tank, was told that nothing would be done in the meantime. The matter will now likely fall to the lot of the new council.

May Extend Street.

The committee had before it four plans passed by the town planning committee at a meeting earlier in the afternoon and these were approved. Two of the subdivisions are east on the Hamilton road, and one in the township. The fourth is an extension of Albion street, West London.

At the conclusion of the meeting Ald. G. B. Drake had a few words of praise to utter for the engineer's department. He said he wanted to congratulate the engineer for the work done during the year. He had done a lot of it and done it well. He also patted City Clerk Baker on the back.

TELLS VALUE OF HEALTH EFFORTS

W. E. Dyer, Welfare Worker,
Gives Continent Campaign
Details.

The Metropolitan Health Extension Bureau, under the supervision of W. E. Dyer, for many years prominent in church and social welfare work in Toronto, conducted a most interesting health educational lecture Tuesday evening in the Ridout Street Methodist Church. Alderman Frank L. Harley presided. In opening the meeting the chairman spoke briefly on behalf of the Western Union bylaw.

Mr. Dyer's lecture was illustrated with lantern slides. There were 50 reproductions in color of the world-famous Tissot Bible paintings, and 50 pictures of modern welfare work.

"Personal and public health means personal and public wealth," declared the speaker. "Health of body, mind and soul is the ideal to be sought by every citizen of this beloved Canada of ours, if we are to attain the greatest good

in service to our fellow man and our Creator."

Save 38,000 Lives.
This health educational work is part of a continent-wide program of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company to co-operate wherever opportunity offers with local boards of health, and state organizations. This intensive welfare work and co-operative effort are carried on entirely gratis by the company.

During 1920 over 15,000,000 copies of public welfare literature were distributed throughout the continent. It is very difficult to estimate in any definite way the value of this work, but in conjunction with the company's free nursing organization in all of the larger cities conservative statistics claim the saving to be 38,000 lives a year.

URGES IMPERIAL TRADE PROGRAM

British Commissioner F. W.
Field Visits City Manu-
facturers.

F. W. Field, British government trade commissioner in Ontario, is visiting the manufacturers of this city with a view to transferring foreign trade to the United Kingdom, or some other part of the Empire.

When interviewed, Mr. Field stated that he found the retail trade very much better than it was a month or so ago, and that he looked for a big increase in manufacturing concerns to keep up with the retail demands, which, he thought, were the natural course of business.

The trade commissioner's office was anxious to get in touch with manufacturers and importers of this city who are at present buying their requirements abroad and outside of the British Empire.

The ultimate aim of the commissioners is to build up a trade that will be inter-imperial, and with this end in view they are co-operating with the board of trade and commerce, Ottawa.

Mr. Field stated that the manufacturers and importers are giving them every encouragement and support, and he looked forward with every confidence to a large amount of trade being switched from foreign competitors to the manufacturers of the British Empire.

The commissioner said a big tribute to the work of the local Chamber of Commerce, with which he has always maintained close co-operation.

STATES ART CANADA'S GREAT ECONOMIC NEED

MONTREAL, Nov. 29.—"Art is the most crying economic need of Canada today," Eric Brown, director of the National Gallery, Ottawa, declared in addressing the Women's Art Society here today.

"If we are to develop commercially, the country must have art at the back of it," he said, adding that the bulk of designing came at the present time from outside of Canada, while the country possessed plenty of talent awaiting only opportunity to be developed.
