POSTAL WORKERS FEAR REDUCTION

London Men State Increase Does Not Reach Total of Bonus.

ACTION IS DELAYED

The long-looked-for news regarding the upward revision of postal salaries that has been under the consideration of the federal government and the civil service commission was received with mixed feelings by local postal workers today.

In the absence of Fred Wilson, secretary for the men, who has just suffered a bereavement, postal workers stated that it will not be known for a few days what action will be taken regarding the report of the civil service commission.

There has been no meeting of executives since the report came out, either here or in the headquarters at Toronto, as yet. It is expected that the men will wait until the executive, made up of representatives of the different locals, has gone into the report, before any action is taken.

Postal workers stated this morning that the report as it stands will mean an actual reduction where it appears to be an increase, for where there are increases in some instances, there will be no bonus, and as the bonus was larger than the proposed increase, the difference will cause a reduction rather than raise, and in some instances this will amount to as much as two hundred dollars per annum.

WILL CALL MEETING.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, June 10.—Although the new salaries for letter carriers and other postal workers, as announced by the Dominion government last night, mean decreases in some cases, with the withdrawal of the "war bonus," it will not be known till Sunday next whether or not the postal workers here will demand a strike as the result of the new gradings.

There will be a mass meeting of the men on Sunday to decide on the action to be taken. Undoubtedly there is a feeling of distinct disappointment among the gradings, while in others there is manifestly an opinion that the new scale should be accepted for the present. Officials of the various postal unions here decline this morning to commit themselves to an opinion on the probable action of the men.

One newspaper here intimates that a strike is quite possible, even probable, all over the Dominion.

WOULD-BE SOLDIER LOSES UNIFORM

Victor Medland Charged With Wearing Prohibited Khaki.

Victor Medland, 561 Queen's avenue, who has been walking round the city in soldier's uniform, was arrested last night by Constable Snell and charged with wearing a prohibited military uniform. The case was held in private, and Medland was dismissed, but not before all military badges purchased locally, had been striped from him on orders of Col. W. M. Lawless, of headquarters' staff.

Discussing the case, which is the first of its kind here since the government order-in-council went into effect last April prohibiting the use of soldiers' uniforms without permission or on stated occasions, Chief Birrell stated Medland was first noticed parading around at the school picnic. He was ordered to leave the park at the time by Sergeant James Oakley, the chief stated, but Constable Snell picked him up last night, swagging stick and all.

Medland, it appears, has a great fondness for a soldier's life, and nothing pleased him more than to don the khaki and walk the streets.

Although he did not serve overseas he managed to get over to England and was shipped back to Canada. He was allowed to retain the clothes. Magistrate Graydon stated at the conclusion of the court, Medland was liable to a \$200 fine and a year's imprisonment for the offence.

DR. BRITAIN UNLIKELY TO COME TO LONDON

Chamber of Commerce Is Not Expected To Act at Present.

That there is no immediate prospect of Dr. Horace L. Britain, head of the Municipal Research Institute of Canada, visiting London, is the opinion of E. J. Penny, assistant secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

In the absence of the secretary, Gordon Philip, Mr. Penny stated today that while not in touch with all the details of the situation, he did not think that there had been any change in the plans, and that a visit in the near future was unlikely.

Dr. Britain, visited London when James Gray was head of the Chamber of Commerce. A survey was made of Victoria Hospital, as well as the police, fire and other civic departments. It was felt at the time that the survey made for efficiency and that at a later date Dr. Britain would return to London to carry out further work.

POSTPONE MEETING.

NEW INSTRUCTOR EXPECTED SOON

M. Smith Will Supervise Printing Plant Installation at "Tech."

COMPLETE PLANT

Mathew Smith, Hamilton, newly appointed instructor in printing, is expected to take charge of the installation of equipment at the Technical High School shortly, in order that the plant be in shape for commencement on September 1. Mr. Smith is a printer of 20 years experience, who has taken a special course in instruction at Toronto and also taught printing for three years at the Hamilton Technical High School.

Blue prints showing the layout of the new department at the Technical High School here provide for a class of 24 at one time, with equipment which equals any first-rate small job plant. There is \$2,000 worth of type, carefully selected in the most useful fonts, two job presses, and other equipment which has been secured at a reasonably low figure.

In the new addition there is a classroom, which will accommodate 24 students at one time, and a larger room, 60 by 60 feet, which will be used as the plant.

Under the present system of tuition, first year male students at the school are given academic training as well as a groundwork in three mechanical phases.

With auto mechanics and printing added to the curriculum, five lines of study will be open in addition to collegiate work. First year students are given opportunity to find their adaptability in these lines and by the end of the term they are ready to launch into a specialty. Tutors are also able to judge a student's progress in the different lines.

The second year is given over entirely to studies in specialties, with no more English and mathematics added. This plan will be followed in the printing department so that by the end of the second year a student in printing will have a valuable groundwork in most every phase of the work. No linotype or monotype setting machines will be installed yet. Basic work at handsetting will be taught thoroughly. Keyboards and machine setting will be available and proper fingering will be taught.

Special classes will be open, both during the day and in the evening, to those who have some training in printing, but want to add knowledge of particular phases of the trade.
