

A. H. MURPHY BUYS REGISTRY OFFICE DESPITE OFFER MADE BY UTILITIES COMMISSION

Property Sold At \$10,500 May Sport Gasoline Service Station.

POLICE STATION UP

Street Railway Purchase Plan Referred Back To Committee.

The old registry office has been sold, the city council last night knocked down the property for \$10,500, and no questions asked. The purchaser was A. H. Murphy, of the legal firm of Murphy, Gunn & Murphy. General understanding amongst the aldermen appeared to be that a service station would be erected on the corner, permission having been asked in the tender to go ahead with construction.

Offer of the public utilities commission to equal the bid of Mr. Murphy was turned down. Citations of objections to a service station at this point came chiefly from Ald. Bottrill and Ald. McKay, but without avail in changing the intentions of the council.

When the matter came to a vote, Ald. Greer moved that the public utilities commission's original tender of \$10,100 be accepted. He was backed up by Ald. McKay, Ald. Bottrill and the mayor. When Ald. Douglas motioned to sell to Mr. Murphy was put, only Ald. Bottrill and Ald. McKay cast dissenting votes. Ald. Hayden, Ald. Warren and Ald. Shaw were absent from the meeting.

Philip Pocock Speaks.
Commissioners Philip Pocock, T. McFarlane and R. J. Webster and General Manager E. V. Buchanan were present to urge that consideration be given their interests. Mr. Pocock said the commission was ready to offer \$10,500 now in order to get consideration. Mr. McFarlane said that the P. U. C. had not entered a third tender because they understood that bids were closed, and that only the construction of an office building was to be permitted. Mr. Buchanan gave assurance that the old registry building would be renovated, that no objectionable odors, dirt, noise, smoke or injurious "rays" would come from a transformer station, for which the commission desired the building.

The other side of the story was heard from A. H. Murphy, who had tendered for the building. It was absurd, he said, to report that the council did not know to whom it was selling the building. He was personally responsible for the purchase and had tendered his personal check to enter negotiations. He characterized the P. U. C. asking to re-open the matter as poor business ethics.

Ald. Bottrill's chief objection was that it had been understood that when the last call for tenders was advertised, construction of an office building on the property should have been specified. He failed to get sufficient support for his objection.

Dam Proposal Quashed.
The council turned down Mayor Wenig's proposal to have a municipal vote in connection with the construction of a \$150,000 dam at Springbank. Objections raised were that the river would not be fit for swimming or bathing, even with the raised water level, unless a large sum were expended on sewage disposal apparatus. When the vote was taken the "yeas" were Drake, Walsh, Smith, Wenig. In opposition were Douglas, Anderson, McKay, Greer, Bottrill and Towe.

Wants New Police Station.

"We only have a barn now. I'm heartily in favor of the building of a new police station," So declared Ald. Towe when the report of No. 1 committee on the police station came up. On the motion of Ald. Douglas the matter was referred back to No. 1 committee.

Only Ald. Greer opposed the move of the mayor and Ald. McKay to recommend to the government the establishment of a bureau of municipal affairs. Ald. Greer's objection was that the matter had not been carefully considered in council.

Mayor Wenig's campaign to get the 80 per cent producers clause back in the market bylaw lost its footing and was rejected by the council. Ald. Smith, Ald. McKay and Ald. Bottrill supported the mayor.

Street Railway Question Up.
Just as the council was about to adjourn shortly after 10 o'clock, attention was called by the assistant city clerk that the clause respecting the street railway price in the finance

PREMIER APPEALS TO PROGRESSIVES

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King Pleads for Unity Against Common Foe.

KEEPS PROMISES

Brandon, Man., Oct. 6.—A plea for unity and co-operation between Liberals and Progressives on the common ground of their mutual opposition to the principles of Conservatism was made here tonight by Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, prime minister of Canada and leader of the Liberal party, to an audience which contained many Progressives, including their federal leader, Robert Forke.

"If," he said, "the forces of those who think liberally and progressive are united from the Atlantic to the Pacific there is going to be a long term of Liberal-Progressive administration, but, if divided we come to face the forces of high protection, which are never divided when the need arises, then we may have an even longer period to regret the mistake we have made. Division of forces is likely to mean victory for the party of Arthur Meighen."

Names are secondary, he declared, and a party was only an instrument to an end. "We are told," added the premier, "that what has been done by this government in the way of tariff reduction has been done under pressure of Western Progressives. That is not true. It was done because we

NOTED LECTURER TO VISIT LONDON

Dr. Charles E. Barker Will Speak At Many Meetings Under Auspices of Rotary.

Dr. Charles E. Barker, who is well known throughout Canada and the United States for his address on "A Father's Responsibility To His Son," will speak in the city next Sunday and Monday. The Rotary club has arranged for Dr. Barker to speak here. No charge will be made at any of the places he will deliver his lectures.

Dr. Barker holds degrees in hygiene and physical culture from several of the leading universities of North America. When William H. Taft was president of the United States, Dr. Barker was his physical advisor.

He has visited 65 cities of North America where Rotary clubs are established. He was first brought to the attention of the Rotary club through an address he delivered at the convention held in Salt Lake City, Utah, in 1919. Since then he has devoted his entire time to giving lectures in places where Rotary is established.

On Sunday night he will speak at one of the leading churches in the city. It has not been definitely decided as yet where it will be, but will be announced as soon as arrangements are made.

On Monday he will address the Rotary club at their weekly luncheon in the Tecumseh House. In the afternoon he will journey to Western

university, where he will give a lecture to the students and faculty. Following that he will go to the C. C. I. and will talk to the pupils for a short while. Later in the afternoon a special session for women will be held at the collegiate, and Dr. Barker will give his well-known address, "A Mother's Responsibility To Her Daughter."

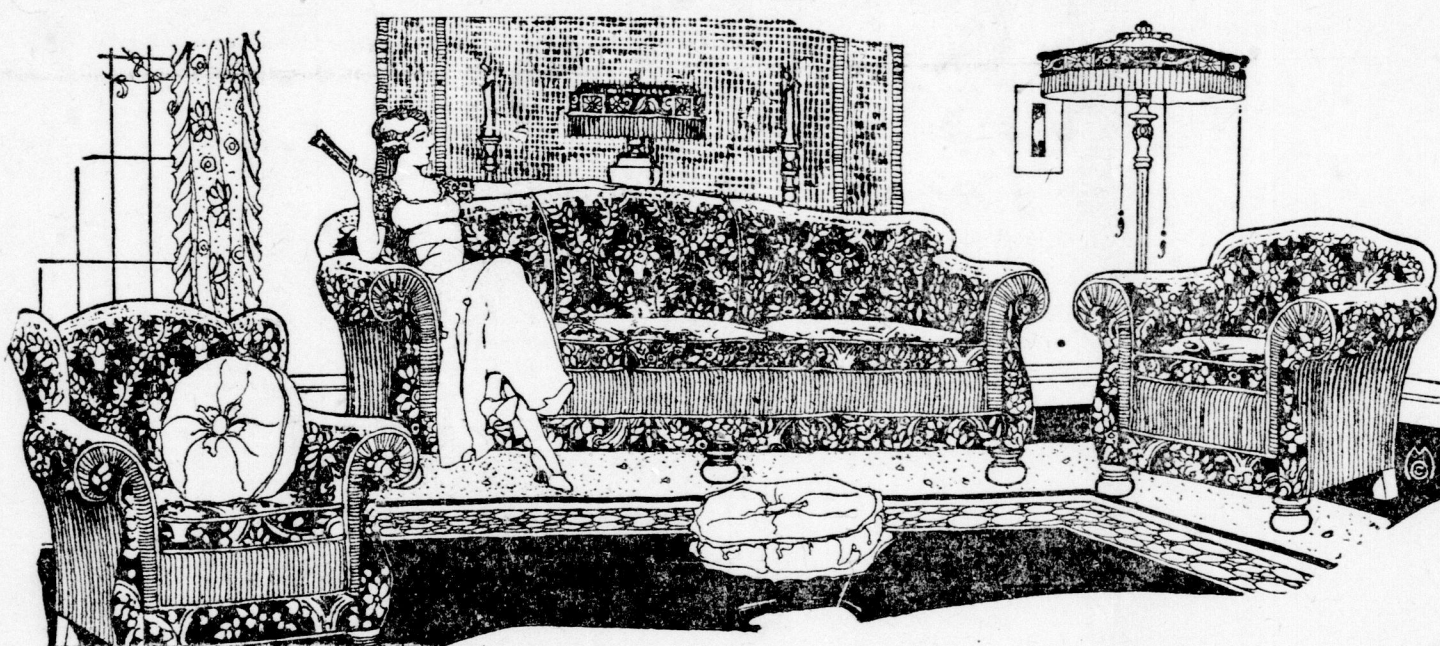
