Self Government of Small Municipalities Suppressed

by Mussolini. By HIRAM K. MODERWELL

Rome, Oct. 4.-Complete suppression of local self-government in Italy for townships under 3,000 inhabitants was virtually decided upon at a conference between Premier Mussolini and Minister of the Interior Federzoni. This may soon be extended to all other municipalities, according to Secretary Farinacci of the Fascist

Rome recently was put under direct administration of the central government in a regime analogous to that of Washington, D.C. All of the officials of the municipal government ficials of the municipal government will have greatly curtailed powers in wor of those of the regional prefect, who is a political appointee of the central government. The city council, from which all trouble makers are automatically excluded, will henceforth have little more than consultive powers, the prefect making all important decisions.

To describe the functionary who will henceforth be dictator of small

towns and townships, the Fascisti have dug up from mediaeval Italian history the name "podesta," which corresponds closely to American own manager.

He will be hired under yearly con-He will be hired under yearly contract and given full powers to rule the cities without reference to parties. As originally provided, the contract was renewable or terminable by the town senate, but the Fascisti rejected this feature, openly declaring that the towns will not get what they want, but what is good for them.
