A horse attached to a buggy in which were Miss White and Shirley street, ran away on the Wortley road Wednesday afternoon, and it then kicked the dashboard, and ran over Mr. W. J. Robt. and his wife. The ladies were only frightened.

Youth and beauty was assembled in the large ball hall of the Tecumseh House Wednesday evening, when about 20 couples of the ladies being from Hellmuth College, while the gentlemen were mostly young citizens, enjoyed themselves in a merry dance. The dancing was given to the College girls, who are about separating for the summer holidays.

The Chief talked very strongly to Murphy, not allowing the idea that he could nothing with the lad, and telling him that he would ruin him if he had him sent to the Reformatory; the man who would think of such a thing should be sent to prison himself.

The decision of P. M. O'Leone, of Stratford, in the case of Gable vs. mail carrier Kumpf, of Nithburg, will be a lasting lesson to the boys not to interfere with the Royal Mail. For the offence of detaining the mail 15 or 20 minutes E. Gable was fined \$50 and costs, amounting in all to about \$70.

An awkward accident happened on the Erie & Huron Railway, at Fargo, on Tuesday morning last at eight o'clock. It appears that one of the railroad employees had tied his cow with a rope near the track, and by an oversight allowed her to much rope, and the animal endeavored to cross the track. THE POLICE COURT.

Cases That Were Ventilated at the Local Tribunal.

P. M. Parke presided at the Police Court yesterday.
Richard Hughes, a helpless drunkard, living over Clarke's Bridge, whose wife left him seventeen years ago, and whose friends claim to have done all the work for him, was sent to jail for two months.

Geo. H. Adams would probably have been allowed his liberty had not his wife appeared in court and told a sad story of the wrongs inflicted by her husband upon her during the last eight years. Adams was fined \$5 or twenty days in jail, and was told that if he ever troubled his wife again he would be sent to the Central Prison.

A young fellow named Davis, who appeared to be very ill, came here from Chesley Wednesday, and the authorities there thinking he would be admitted to the Hospital. Davis was allowed to go to jail or wherever he chose, and he went out into the cold, cold world.

The P. M. expressed himself very strongly on the action of the Hospital authorities in refusing to care for such a person.
Last Sunday evening Robert Pugsley, a youth living in the southern part of the city, was going to church, and was waiting for a companion at the corner of South and William streets, when three or four other lads came along, and one of them used some improper language. Mr. Chas. Parker lives on this corner, and he came out and ordered the boys to move on. They did so and young Pugsley was walking across the road when Parker came up from behind and shoved him down in the road, repeating the offence and tearing Pugsley's coat.

Pugsley was going to no vile work. This was the case as told by witnesses on both sides at the Police Court. The Magistrate held that the defendant was justified in his action, and dismissed the case. Mrs. Pugsley states that she will appeal the case, if she can.

Handed Over Their Stock.
The Empire Loan and Investment Company Wins up its Business.

The majority of the Directors of the Empire Company have purchased stock in the Dominion, and the Directors of the Board rendered vacant by the sale and transfer. The cause of the closing up is attributed to the efforts of one or more stockbrokers who desired to secure control of the Empire Company's stock and then hand it over to one of the other loan societies here.

At 3.30 Wednesday afternoon the residence of Mr. W. Sage, 462 Maitland street, was the scene of a brilliant gathering, the occasion being the marriage of his eldest daughter, Miss Mabel Sage, to Mr. W. J. Robt. of Detroit. Miss Mabel Sage, sister of the bride, and Miss Grace Robertson, sister of the groom, acted as bridesmaids.

Mr. Milton Robertson and Mr. B. Brown assisted the groom. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Ira Smith, assisted by Rev. A. C. Courtice. The bride and bridemaids were very prettily attired, and, as usual on such occasions, were the admired of all admirers. The numerous and elegant presents received by the couple were from Colorado, California, Dakota, Kansas, Nova Scotia, Indiana, Michigan and other parts, testified to the high esteem in which the bride was held by her numerous friends.

At 7 o'clock they departed, under a hearty shower of rice, for the west. Samuel Willis and his family, of the town line between East Nissouri and the Gore of Downie, had a miraculous escape at Stratford Wednesday afternoon. They were driving home after three o'clock in the night. In front of J. & R. Forbes a heavy barn man named Nichol ran the runaway into a tree with a crash. The boy was thrown about twenty feet, and at once set up a piteous cry, but it was soon learned that he was more frightened than hurt.

SYNOD OF HURON.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION.

The House met at half-past ten. Rev. Canon O'Meara, of Windsor, was invited to a seat on the floor of the House.

A telegram was read from the Synod of Montreal, in reply to that sent yesterday thanking the Synod of Huron for fraternal greeting and good wishes.

Revs. L. Desbrisay, W. T. Cliff, S. E. G. Edlestein and R. Hicks, Messrs. E. Paul, T. D. Stanley, R. Fox and C. Kingston were elected scrutineers for the election of delegates to the Provincial Synod.

Revs. W. Johnston, A. Griffin, W. Wade and W. Lowe, Messrs. E. A. Goodeve, L. Skeg, Capt. Cox and Thomas were elected scrutineers in the election to the Executive Committee.

By Rev. W. Craig.—That the Board of Management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society be paid all necessary expenses incurred while attending the meetings of said Board, one-half of said expenses to be paid out of the Epiphany-tide offerings, and the other half out of the Ascension-tide offering.

By T. H. Luscombe.—That a standing committee on temperance be appointed, and that such committee be empowered to investigate the condition of the temperance organization existing in connection with the church in this Diocese; to take such steps as may be deemed necessary to visit, revive, and increase such organizations; to perform such services, and generally to take such action as may be deemed conducive to the welfare of the temperance movement.

By G. C. Mackenzie.—That the Synod authorize the S. S. Committee to purchase \$150 worth of charts and pamphlets illustrating the Church Catechism about to be published by Rev. Mr. Carswell.

The following were appointed a committee to deliberate on the scheme for the consolidation of the church—Revs. Dean Innes (Convener), Archdeacon Marsh, W. A. Young, Alfred Brown, T. R. Davis, G. C. Mackenzie, Canon Smith and R. McCosh, Messrs. Cronyn (Chancellor), Judge Ermentrout, R. Bayly, Q. C., M. Wilson, Q. C., W. J. Inlath, C. Jenkins and I. F. Hellmuth.

The Committee on Synod assessment reported, recommending that delegates from parishes in arrears be allowed to take their seats on payment of this year's dues, those parishes, however, not to be relieved of their dues. It also recommended a committee appointed to consider the rearrangement of the assessments of the whole Synod.

Rev. Mr. Young moved in amendment to the last part of the report that the assessment rearrangement be left to the Executive Committee.

The report was adopted with Mr. Young's amendment.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.
The Very Rev. the Dean then introduced the proposed amendments to canon 28 on the widows' and orphans' fund, which was taken up in committee.

It was still under discussion when the Synod rose.
