Five Deaths by Lightning.

St. Louis, Mo., July 18.—The storm of yesterday and last night was general throughout the state. In many places the rainfall exceeded two inches. Reports so far received show that four buildings were struck by lightning and 3 persons killed. In this city yesterday 26 persons were overcome by the heat and three deaths resulted.

Chicago, July 18.—Severe storms were reported from various parts of Illinois and Indiana. At McKinlay, John Barclay was killed by lightning and Roland McAlister and William Cole were severely shocked. At Loganport, Ill., Edward Johnson, a farmer, was killed by lightning. At Peoria, Ill., the heaviest rainfall in 40 years occurred. One thousand feet of track on the Peoria and Pekin Union Railway was washed out and other railways entering the city suffered considerable damage.
