QUEBEC, August 1.—Speaking last night at a dinner of the provincial branch of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada at Montmorency Falls, Premier Taschereau declared that the Quebec liquor law was still in the experimental stage. It had netted the province during its first year \$4,000,000. With this period \$15,000,000 worth of alcohol was sold to a population of 2,500,000. This averaged 5¢ per head per annum, or 60 cents per month, or 1 1/2¢ per day. But Quebecers, said Premier Taschereau, were not the only customers of the liquor commission. It was the visiting Americans who brought down the average of alcohol in Quebec for its citizens to a cent a day per head. People were seldom embarrassed with their money, the premier continued. The \$4,000,000 revenue from alcohol would tend to reduce the floating debt of the province, Quebec, he affirmed, was the least taxed province in the Dominion. He concluded by saying that he hoped the good roads planned for the future would attract many visitors from across the line.

Indolent Adrianople Prospers Under Greeks

The Hellenic army commanders have ordered their men to cultivate the friendship of the Turkish population, but while the Turks have profited commercially from the presence of the army, their strong sense of patriotism and nationalism would not permit them to be driven out. For by centuries of history and association Adrianople, once their capital, is as dear to them as Constantinople.

Then, as the wheel was released, the machine slewed, the two men caught hold of the half-insensible Jones and threw him bodily from the car. They then drove on.

Jones related that as they were passing through Burlington one of the men leaped over the front seat and covering Jones with a revolver, told him to halt. Jones' obedience to the command not being fast enough to suit the gunman, the latter lifted the weapon, but first, and brought it down upon Jones' head. Then, as the wheel was released, the machine slewed, the two men caught hold of the half-insensible Jones and threw him bodily from the car. They then drove on.
