TORONTO, March 1.—St. Patrick's 5-1 victory over the tail-end Boston Bruins at the arena on Saturday night in the second last game of the National Hockey League regular season was well earned and in addition was a very valuable one. 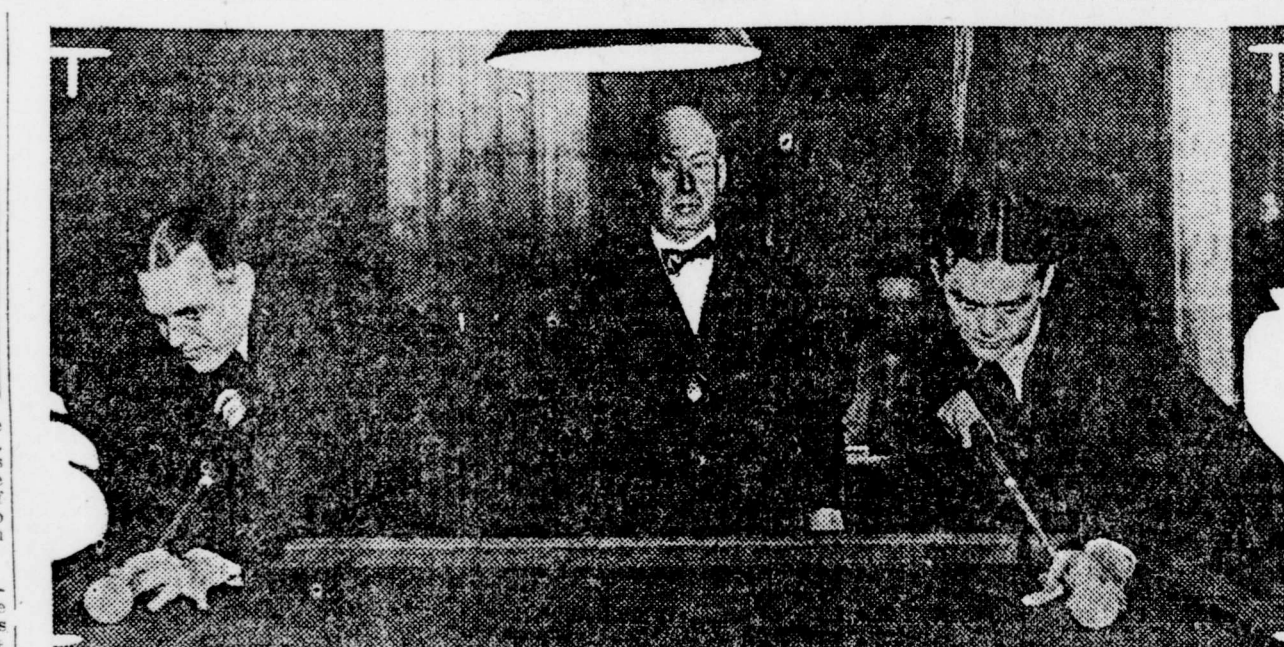
The game was very clean, no penalties being awarded against either team. The best of feeling prevailed between the two teams.
