## LOCAL DEATH ROLL

JOSEPH CHIPMAN MORSE

Deceased, long a reader of the MONITOR and one of its devoted subscribers through a long life time, passed to rest on Sunday evening, Jan 2nd, at 6:45 and only preceded by his wife Almira B. Morse by a month and a half. Happy are they who can travel the Eternal Road together, not sundered by Time, and those dreary gaps which some time separate comrades on the great journey from this world to a world to come!

Born in Paradise, seventy six years ago, Nov 2d, he lived for the entire time in his native village, and on the ancestral farm first settled by his predecessors in 1760, who came from Massachusetts and were descendants of Samuel Morse, son of the Rev. Thomas Morse, rector of Foxearth, Essex Co., England, who was eighth rector of that parish in 1855.

His parents, William Morse, of Paradise, and Lavinia Chipman, (daughter of Major Chipman Esq., custos rotularum of Annapolis County) are well known to many of the older readers. The surviving children are Rev. W. Inglis Morse, Capt. Mass., Dr. V. C. Morse, and Ewart Gladstone Morse, of Paradise. One sister, Mrs. Jilla Gillatt, his senior, survives him. She is now a resident of Plainfield, New Jersey.

Great patience characterized the last days of his sufferings. Now that he has departed, his going will be missed in the community in which he lived and that sterling honesty and charity always manifest. May light perpetual shine upon his way.
