### Local Happenings

Annapolis hockey team is scheduled to play here on Thursday night. The Annapolis team generally is composed of younger players than the other two and on this occasion Bridgetown will use more of her younger players than heretofore so that the contest should be a good one. It will also probably be the last match of the season here with an outside team and should not be missed.

Commencing this week the St. James' Church Organized Bible Class will hold its study session on Friday evening instead of Wednesday. The class meets from 7.30 to 8.30, and is followed by their practice. A service will be held on Wednesday evenings during Lent commencing at 7.30.

The social gathering in St. James' Church school room last Wednesday evening, under the auspices of the Organized Bible Class was a great success from every point of view and many regrets were expressed that it was the last of the series for this season. A very sociable crowd, a bright programme, and most delectable provision for the inner man were the constituent elements. It is hoped that ere another season rolls round a piano may be secured to take the place of the organ at present in use.

Norman A. Falkner, the one-legged skater, gave notable exhibition at the rink here on Monday night in fancy skating, backward and forward movement. He is a marvellous performer, and the way in which he adjusts body movements on the ice to make up for the loss of his leg is remarkable in the extreme. A large crowd witnessed his performances with great interest.

After a vacation which was not a vacation at all, the C. N. R. train arrived here on Saturday morning for the first time in over two weeks. Between run offs, snow and ice difficulties, to say nothing of beavers, conspiring to flood the tracks, the branch has been playing in hard luck. The work of breaking out the remainder of the road is proceeding as it is essential to get apples moved as quickly as possible from warehouses below here.

On Thursday at Wolfville will take place the Inauguration of Rev. Frederick W. Patterson as President of Acadia University. Among the speakers were Premier the Hon. E. H.
