An impression had somewhat got abroad impression had somewhat the meet; how we do not know—that the meeting was for Tuesday evening, and hee-keepers as many as a dozen or two bee-keepers Came in for the meeting that evening. They could not stay till the time set and went away disappointed. The prime object of the meeting was

to give a reception to the two foreign gentlemen who were tavoring Canada with a visit, viz.: Thomas William Cowan, Esq., Chairman British Beekeepers' Association, and Editor of the British Bee Journal, and Ivar S. Young, Esq., Elitor Norwegian Bee Journal. The latter gentleman has been delegated as a commissioner by the Norwegian Government to visit the United States and Canada, with the object of gleaning all the new things he could, with reference to bees and bee-keeping. He is also Manager of the Norwegian Beekeepers' Association.
