It affords us pleasure to present our readers with portraits of Rev. J. W. MacKenzie and his wife, our honoured and faithful missionaries in Efate, New Hebrides. Mr. MacKenzie is a native of Pictou county, Nova Scotia,—the fourth of a family of ten children. One of his brothers, Rev. J. A. MacKenzie, is the pastor of Pugwash and Oxford, Nova Scotia. His father, Mr.

Alexander MacKenzie, was for many years an elder in Salem Church, Green Hill, Pictou. Young MacKenzie was brought up under the ministry of Rev. George Patterson D.D. From the time that he was eight years of age, he cherished the thought of becoming a missionary,—though he never spoke of this to anyone till he had offered himself to the Foreign Mission Board. He
