Will he make a statement of motions setting forth the official view of the government about the applicability of the Jay Treaty generally and in particular about the border crossing privileges of thousands of Indian people? Will he make this statement either this week or during the first week of sitting after the Christmas recess? I ask this question, Your Honour, in view of the fact that Thursday, the day after tomorrow, is the first anniver-sary of the blockade of the bridge at Cornwall Island, and also in view of the claim of the Indian people-
