My dear Dr. Tory,

As promised, I have written to the Department of Agriculture, asking for the nomination of a representative of theirs to serve on the Committee of the Institute of Parasitology. I have also written to General Macgrien regarding any assistance to our work which can be given by the Northwest Mounted Police.

But my particular reason for writing to you at this moment is to tell you that at our meeting last Thursday I neglected to bring forward a proposal for graduate students working in the Department of Parasitology. This proposal was forwarded to me by Dr. Eve, Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research of McGill, and I was instructed to bring it to the Institute Committee for their consideration and approval.

The intention is to secure only first rate men who would materially assist in the carrying out of research in parasitology of such a character as would be beneficial to the aims of the Institute. I am very sorry that I overlooked this matter.

Will you examine it and tell me if you think we may take a chance on inserting this in our Announcement of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research?
