an assortment of the best apples the year round. Let the farmer then look about him during this month, and procure such apple grafts, as will give an ample supply of all the most desimble kinds. The Farmer himself should procure his own grafts, label them properly, and then, when put in, he will be cortain of the fruit fie wishes. We then again ask the reader, are your apples good? and if not, urge upon him the importance of attending to the matter without delay, as every year's delay in grafting, renders another year's use of worthless fruit necessary. Finish threshing your grain, and have it stored beyond the reach of rat, mouse, or weevil. If the roots have not been assorted when housed for the winter, the best should now be selected for seed and use, and the remainder fed out to the stock previous to the growth of green food in the spring. If you expect hens to lay during the winter, they must have a warm room, and plenty of suitable food, and in addition a supply of gravel and old mortar, or lime, and water,
