Head. At any Rate, it is a Matter where we are to hope rather for Confolation than Cure; for I do not fee how fuch a Population is to be rooted out, or indeed thinned, fo as to make any confiderable Diminution. There have been Projects, on former Occafions, when the Ifland was thought to be overrun with Inhabitants, for fending People to Nova Scotia, and other Places, where Inhabitants were wanted, but I do not remember that thefe were ever carried into effect.

Of the prefent Triennial floating Government.

I cannot help faying, that the grand Means employed to prevent the Increase of Inhabitants has, in my Opinion, contributed to their Increase. It has all along been the Inclination to fay, that there should be no Resident Government, because, if there was, Newsfoundland would become a Colony. None have been more strenuous than the Western Merchants in keeping up the Crv against a Governor; they have constantly alledged the above Reafon, and that Reason has always passed for a good one.

I take the Liberty of doubting whether this Reafon was a good one. I never can be brought to think, but that placing a Governor there, whofe Bufinefs it fhould be to prevent People fettling, would have been a more probable Method of preventing it than continuing the prefent floating Government, which has no regular Authority to fend Perfons Home, and which departs from the Ifland juft at the Time when the Seamen and Fithermen are hefitating whether
