

PUBLIC OPINION IS LACKING IN TORONTO'S MUNICIPAL LIFE

Morley Wickett Tells Women's Canadian Club His Ideal of a Modern City—Toronto Has Developed so Fast That Civic Life Stagnates.

Dr. Morley Wickett, who addressed the Women's Canadian Club in the lecture hall of the Y.W.C.A. yesterday afternoon, is optimistic in regard to the movement to give married women the vote in the near future.

The subject of the doctor's address was the "Ideal City." Referring to Toronto, the speaker told of a lady, intellectual and cultured, who had been asked to use her influence to prevail upon her husband to run for the city council.

"It is necessary to have men in the city council who can size up the needs of a city and assist in their solution," said Morley Wickett, "Ontario is the only corner of Canada where the council are elected for the space of a year. This is too short to prove a man's efficiency."

The workman, he said, is living under impossible conditions, and a house and land monopoly has been created owing to lack of transportation.

The fundamental of all democratic institutions is publicity. Without this there is apathy and disregard.

Dr. Wickett hoped the ladies would use their influence with their husbands, fathers, brothers and sons to become interested in ideal civic life.

APPEAL IN PROSPECT

HAMILTON, Dec. 5.—The decision of the Dominion Railway Commission, which it has the jurisdiction to compel the T. H. & B. Railway Company to abandon its right of way to the city and to the street cut in conjunction with the G.P.R. and C.N.R., is highly important, and has created no small amount of enthusiasm in civic circles.

Both Commissioners Drayton and Scott agree that, notwithstanding special acts of parliament and the municipal legislation in regard to the construction of the railway, the commission has jurisdiction to order such deviation as may now be demanded in the interests of public safety and convenience.
