Made Violent Resistance.

Mrs. Hall and Miss Roe were sentenced to three months' imprisonment each. Miss Armes was found not guilty, and Miss Jameson was discharged for lack of evidence.

When these plants are planted in especially favorable situations where the full benefit of sun and air and rich soil can be utilized, the startling effects produced cannot be described.


