With the outbreak of the great European conflict and the prospect of Canadian troops being actively engaged in hostilities in a measurable time, the public demand for war news has grown to a degree hitherto unknown in the history of Canadian newspaperdom. The World, however, is prepared to supply this demand for news from the front, and towards this has already secured the direct cable service of the Central News Agency, acknowledged as the best news service between London and this continent. Also in order to make provision for other war news, it has been decided to transfer the magazine and women's pages to pages ten and eleven. This means that pages four and five will be devoted entirely to news from the front.

CRAPE FESTOONS WERE REMOVED

Strassburg Monument in Paris Bedecked With Flowers and Palm Branches.

PARIS, Aug. 11.—The crape festoons which for 40 years have hung from the monument of the City of Strassburg, capital of Alsace-Lorraine, which stands in the Place de la Concorde, were torn down today and replaced with flowers and palm branches, while a tri-colored sash was draped about the figure.

The ceremony was conducted by 300 members of the Federation of Alsation Societies in Paris. Joseph Sansonnet, mayor of the eighth arrondissement, embraced the statue and then addressing the gathering, said:

"The hour of revenge for which we have prayed unceasingly for 44 years, has at last struck. The French army is in Alsace. The red trousers are again seen on our plains and mountains. The gay bugles of France sounded the charge at Altkirch and Mulhouse."

There were few who were not in tears as the speaker concluded. The singing of the Marseillaise followed by cheers for Belgium, Russia and England ended the ceremony.

GERMANS FAILED IN FIERCE ATTACK

Among Dead Are Said to Be Prince William of Lippe and Son.

Canadian Press Despatch.—BRUSSELS, Aug. 11.—The Germans made a desperate attack on Fort Seralong, south of Liege, Sunday night, and were repulsed with heavy loss. It is estimated that 800 Germans were killed within an area of half a square mile. A bridge which the Germans were crossing was shattered by the fire of the fort which had an exact range. The Germans attempted the assault with great courage. Some of their dead were found directly in front of the barb wire fencing that surrounds the fort. It is reported that Prince William of Lippe and his son, who were killed, were charging at the head of 1000 German soldiers. Their bodies were buried near the fort.

TO DEFEND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Ireland, Aug. 11.—It is announced that a distinguished Irish general on the retired list is coming to Ireland on behalf of the British Government, to consult with the provisional committee of the Nationalist volunteers and arrange measures of defence.

NO NAVAL BATTLE IN BALTIC SEA YET

Russian Fleet Has Not Met German Fleet, But is Waiting Its Chance.

Canadian Press Despatch.—STOCKHOLM, via London, AUG. 11.—The Swedish steamer Runerberg, which arrived here from Rauno, Finland, reported that she had not seen a single warship in the Aland Archipelago, or anywhere else. Her captain was told that the Russian fleet had not met the German fleet at all, but was waiting in the inner part of the Gulf of Finland for a suitable opportunity to start an action. The Russians are concentrating their troops along the Gulf of Finland, especially at Ekens, the north side of the entrance to the gulf, and Sveaborg, and keeping in reserve a considerable force, reported to number 100,000 men.

A pier a half mile in length in the harbor of Hango, was blown up by mistake. The commander, who had been ordered to prepare for the possible destruction of the pier, hanged himself upon discovering that he had acted prematurely.

The vessel had no news from the Baltic.

The concentration of Russian forces in strength at Ekens apparently disproves the report widely published on Saturday that a German army of 40,000 men had been landed there and was marching on Helsinki.

ITALY DEMANDS AN EXPLANATION

Austria Must Tell Why She Bombarded Montenegrin Port.

Canadian Press Despatch.—LONDON, Aug. 11.—According to the correspondent of The Morning Post at Rome the relations between Italy and Austria are becoming more strained. Italy has demanded an explanation of the bombardment of the establishment of the Puglia Company at Antivari, Montenegro, over which the Italian flag flies and in which there were Italians.

The economic effects of the war already are severely felt in Italy. Train service has been reduced to save coal for necessity. There is scarcity of the smaller denominations of money everywhere. The mayor of Rome has issued a list of maximum prices which may be charged for food.

U.S. FRIEND OF JAPAN SO PREMIER DECLARES

Canadian Press Despatch.—TOKYO, Aug. 11.—Count Okuma, the premier, today in an address to the newspapermen in Japan, urged them to refrain from sensational rumors and inflammatory articles in such critical times, saying they were calculated to unduly excite the public and injure Japan's relations with friendly countries. The premier instanced what he termed a false assertion that the United States was sending a fleet to Japan. "America," concluded the premier, "has made no demand on Japan and remains Japan's friend."

BROCKVILLE MAN ANXIOUS.

BROCKVILLE, Aug. 11.—There is one citizen in Brockville who is greatly perturbed over the present chaotic condition of affairs in Europe. On June 26 last Mrs. Michael Wendling, accompanied by her daughter and son, left for a visit to relatives in their native country, Alsace-Lorraine. Mr. Wendling received a card written aboard the liner on which they sailed, and that is the last he has heard from them.

RELIEF FUND GROWS.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The national relief fund for the families of soldiers and sailors killed or wounded in the war, which was started under the auspices of the Prince of Wales and Queen Mother Alexandra, amounted this morning to \$2,240,000.

BIG RUSSIAN FUNDS SEIZED BY GERMANY

Twenty-Five Millions in Berlin Banks Said to Have Been Confiscated.

Canadian Press Despatch.—LONDON, Aug. 11.—A Central News Despatch from Berlin says the Russian funds seized by the German Government in Berlin banks are said to total \$25,000,000.

A special commission appointed by the Government in Germany reports that the country has a sufficient stock of food to last for a year.

Emperor William has given \$100,000 to the German Red Cross Society, and a similar sum for the relief of the families of soldiers killed or wounded in the fighting.

RUSSIANS DISLODGE BODY OF AUSTRIANS

Cossacks Sabred Infantry and Lancers and Landwehr Fled.

ST. PETERSBURG, via London, 3.05 p.m., Aug. 11.—The Russian general staff announces that the Russian troops today dislodged a large body of Austrian troops from the entrenched village of Zalotche, in Austrian Galicia, to the southwest of Radziviloff, in the Russian Province of Volhynia. The Russians sabred a section of the 15th Austrian Infantry, while the 19th Austrian Lancers and the 33rd Austrian Landwehr fled in disorder. The Austrian troops who previously had occupied Radziviloff hastily evacuated the place after the Russian success on Austrian territory. No other serious engagements have been reported from the Austro-Russian frontier.
