CZAR LISTENS TO FACTION WHICH ADVISES APPEAL

Circular Asking for Report on What Result Would Be Has-Been Sent to Local Authorities.

St. Petersburg, July 14.—It was reported to-night that Emperor Nicholas is listening to a faction at court, which advises the desperate expedient of an ppeal to the country thru new elecions. This plan is to dissolve the lower house and at the same time to anounce new elections on the basis of iniversal suffrage, and it is said that a circular asking for a report on what the result of such new elections would be has already been sent to the local authorities.
