TORONTO JUNCTION, Aug. 9.—Dr. Hopkins, medical health officer, leaves to-morrow for Picton and the Thousand Islands, for a few days holiday. Complaints of any kind should be made at the town hall to Dr. Clendinning, who will be M.H.O. during the absence of Dr. Hopkins.

Joseph Daly, whose two brothers were drowned in the Humber Bay disaster, met with an accident yesterday afternoon which might have proved fatal. Daly was working near the stationery engine in Dalby's milk yard, when a steam valve burst and a piece of timber fell and struck him on the head, rendering him unconscious. He recovered soon afterwards and was taken to his home.

A horse belonging to Howell & Elliott of Lambton Mills was seized with a violent attack of acute indigestion about 8 o'clock last night while in the Junction. The horse was removed to Rutledge's livery stable and was attended by Dr. Cunningham.

Advantages of a High School—The Smallpox Scare.

NORTH TORONTO, Aug. 9.—W. J. Thomson, principal of the Deer Park Public School, discussing the question of locating a high school in North Toronto, considers that the move is in the right direction. The whole surrounding district would be benefited by having a high school at North Toronto. Pupils would attend it from the north and the south, from the west and the east, and even from the north end of the city, as all the colleges in the city are overcrowded. While it may be true that the taxpayers of the town would be called upon to pay a higher rate for a few years, yet ultimately the taxes necessary for this particular branch of education would be reduced to a minimum, as the high school would induce people to locate in town, and the principal of the Belknap Public School would be relieved of the fifth class work, where a saving would be accomplished. Mr. Thomson gave it as his firm belief that a number of Deer Park scholars would attend a high school if established.
