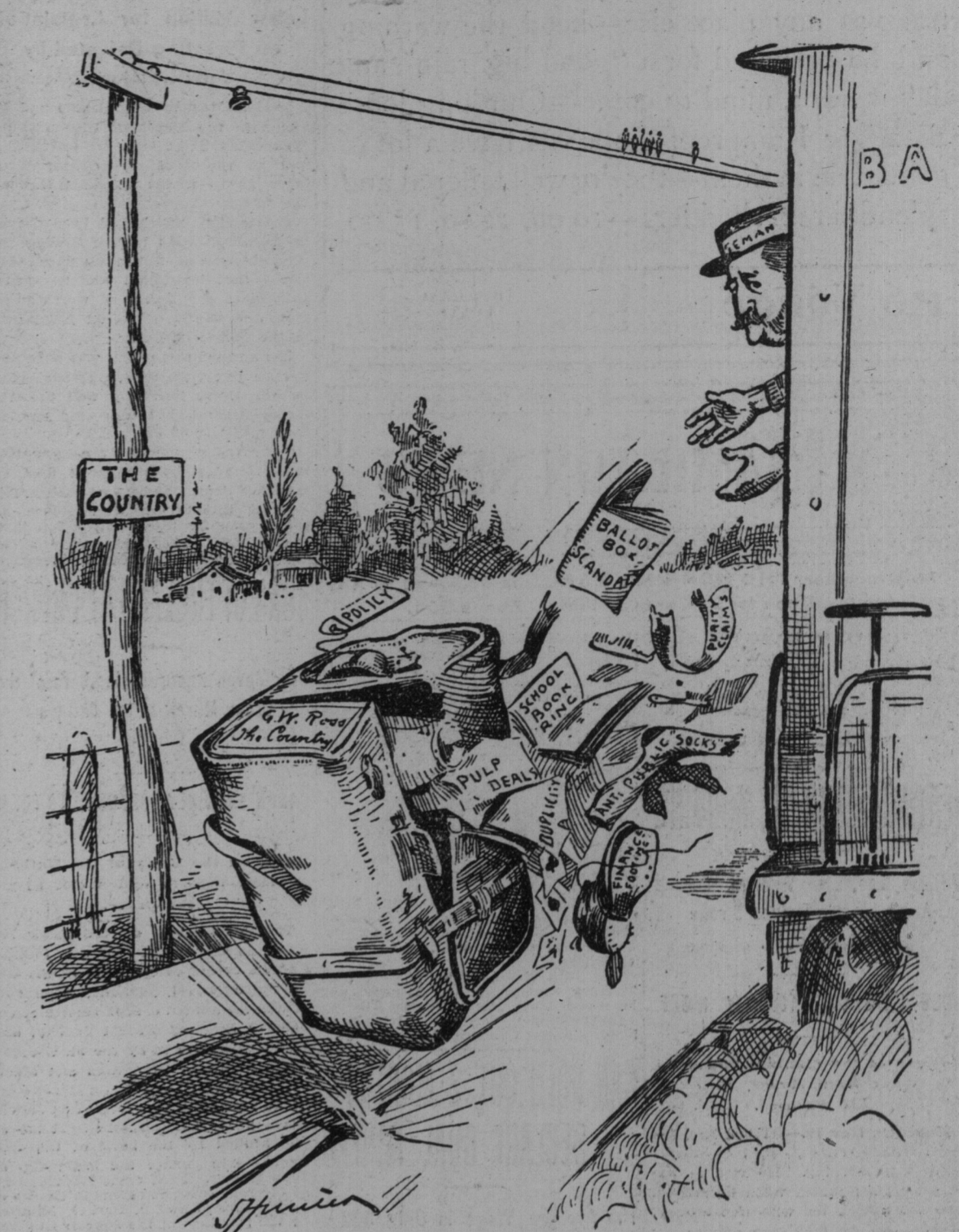

Madrid, May 18.—An Anarchist plot against King Alfonso has been discovered. Six arrests in the matter, including that of Gabriel Lopez, an employe of a dynamite company, have been made.

Three Andalusian Anarchists arrived here May 2 and were arrested shortly after their arrival.

All are Anarchists. Four other men have been arrested in connection with the affair, and none of them deny being Anarchists.
