EFFECTIVE PIECE OF IRONY

"Tim" Healy's Speech on the Uganda Railway Made a Hit in the Commons.

PRaised THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICY

Which He Was Sure Would Bring Calm to Kerry and Balm to Ballydoole.

London, Oct. 26.—Mr. "Tim" Healy's speech in the House of Commons on the re-assembly of parliament a few days ago won general praise as one of the most effective pieces of political irony ever uttered within the walls of St. Stephen's. As reported in The London Daily Telegraph the speech ran as follows:

Mr. Healy said he rose for the purpose of saying a few words on the subject of the Uganda Railway. [Loud laughter.] Speaking as a native of Uganda—[renewed laughter]—he wished to thank the government for the great measure of advancement, which he was sure would bring calm to Kerry and balm to Ballydoole—[laughter]—namely, the proposed expenditure upon that country of a large amount of public money, and the taking up of the time of the House with regard to a project of that description. He could not help feeling that the government on the proposal to spend time and money upon the inhabitants of that distant and neglected land [Laughter.] Uganda was a place which had always been foremost in his thoughts.

They had been brought up to love and reverence it, and it was at least a consolation that that long neglected country should at length have won the favor and approbation of the Prime Minister of England to such an extent that he was prepared in a time of great stringency, and when the education bill was exciting so much passion, to give the people of that country the hope of having a large portion of the time of the House of Commons devoted to it. There must be some reason for this flattering attention to Uganda. He believed it was a crimeless country—[laughter]—and that its administration was in the hands of the most pure souled removable which the British empire could afford. Law and order there proceeded with a regularity of which he had no example in this country, and hence it was that the British parliament turned aside from mere party topics, such as the affairs of Ireland, of England, Scotland and Wales, and devoted itself with one voice to the interests of the people of that afflicted land. [Laughter.] New as the right honorable gentleman was to the office of Prime Minister, he had given a pledge to the empire at large which would redound to the credit of the British empire, and every land and kingdom and republic, too, absorbed by England—[laughter]—that however much this parliament might have its hands full, if it were a ruler, a painted savage, or a heathen roaming the woods, the Prime Minister of England would not let a single day pass without an Irish parliament—[loud laughter]—and that in his generosity he would be prepared to appeal to the chancellor of the exchequer to pour out the gold of England for the benefit of this benighted and dejected savage.

The Irish members had long gloried in the destruction of their own parliament, because where in Ireland, within the narrow walls of an Irish parliament, could they imagine such indifference; where could they imagine such apathy, when their own country was palpitating, thrilling, and throbbing with passionate emotion, as to turn aside to contemplate the position of the negroes of Uganda? [Laughter.] Hence it was that in future the administration which he had always felt would now be something ethical and ennobling, and they would go back to their own country with the glorious and glowing principle that Kerry might be neglected, Connaught might be starved, but at least that House had an eye and a watchful care for the people of Uganda. [Loud laughter.]

Farmer's Sudden Call.
St. Thomas, Oct. 26.—Jacob Gilbert, one of the oldest residents of Southwold, died suddenly Friday afternoon. He fell in a field while going to the barn to assist in the threshing, and in a few minutes was unconscious. He was born in Woodhouse 85 years ago, and lived on the farm on which he died for 60 years.

Vienna, Oct. 26.—A newspaper of Budapest publishes the announcement that Archduke Franz Ferdinand, the heir presumptive to the Austro-Hungarian throne, has decided to renounce his claim in favor of his nephew, Carl Franz Joseph, 15 years old.

CONDUCTOR MARKS GUILTY

This Makes the Fourth Conviction in the Toronto Railway Co. Digger Cases.

JURY OUT ONLY HALF AN HOUR

Whittington and Shea to Be Tried Next Thursday—This Week's Program for Sessions.

The trial of John Marks was concluded in the Criminal Sessions at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, when the jury returned a verdict of guilty. Marks was specifically charged with stealing seven red tickets from his Toronto Street Railway fare-box, on April 23. It was the fifth of the "digger" cases tried at the sittings. Of the series there have been convictions in four cases. Marks was represented by T. C. Robinson, K.C., and the Crown by H. H. Dewar, K.C. John B. Campbell presented the case against Marks. On a Bathurst-street fare-box he saw Marks dig and take out seven red tickets from his box. When asked by Campbell where he disposed of his stealings he said he had sold them to a customer who was in the habit of taking them from him.

Verdict in Half an Hour.
Mr. Bailey, Campbell's superior officer, was asked by Mr. Robinson if he knew how much the company paid for the tickets and under what circumstances he knew nothing about the arrangement. Mr. Robinson said he did not think it necessary to submit any evidence, and so he spoke last to the jury. The jury retired at 2:30 to consider their verdict, and were out half an hour.

Cases for This Week.
On Monday Warren Wilson will be tried on a charge of obtaining money from Dr. Langstaff of Richmond Hill by false pretences.

On Tuesday the indictment against the city for allowing the Dundas-street pavement to remain in a state of disrepair will be pressed to trial. Then will follow the trial of Thomas Feeney, who is charged with rioting during the street railway strike.

On Thursday James R. Whittington and Charles Shea will be tried. These are two "digger" cases.

In the "digger" cases, the following ex-convicts have been found guilty and are now awaiting sentence: Geo. S. Howland, Harvey W. Rummen, Robert J. Bennett, John Marks, Louis D. Bailey, charged in the first of the series of "digger" cases, was acquitted.

Infringement of a Trade Mark.
In an action in the High Court of Justice for Ontario, recently tried before Chancellor Boyd at Toronto, The Slater Shoe Company, and Charles E. Slater, president, of Montreal, makers of the famous Slater Shoe, obtained a judgment against the defendant, Owen Sound, from advertising, offering, or selling shoes under the Slater Shoe Company's "Slater Shoes" or "Slater Goods," or "The Slater Shoe."

The Chancellor also ordered Wilkinson to pay the costs of the action. It seems Wilkinson was offering for sale shoes made by a manufacturer in Montreal, whose name was somewhat similar to The Slater Shoe Company. This maker came up from Montreal and gave evidence at the trial, and appeared to be looking after the defence for Wilkinson, but the Chancellor, after hearing the evidence, decided that no one, except the Slater Shoe Company, had a right to use the name "Slater Shoes," "Slater Goods," "The Slater Shoe," or any similar names in connection with boots and shoes, and that Wilkinson had no right to use any name or names in connection with boots and shoes which might enable him to pass off a shoe not of the company's make, as being of their make, or in any way to reap the benefit of the reputation which the Slater Shoe has acquired throughout the Dominion of Canada.

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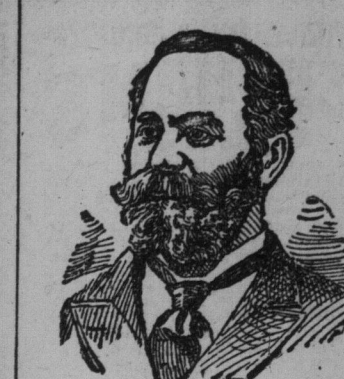

MARCONI COMING BACK. Aims to Perfect a Transatlantic Wireless Telegraph Service.

New York, Oct. 26.—For the purpose of trying to perfect a transatlantic wireless telegraph service, William Marconi is coming back here. Indeed, he is already on the way on the Carlo Alberto, a flagship of the Italian navy, and is expected to arrive in a day or so. His plan is to go to Cape Cod and to Cape Breton.

At both these places he has built long-distance sending and receiving stations for his wireless system, and he intends, immediately after his arrival, to begin further transatlantic tests. He hopes that these trials will quickly result in his being able to establish practical and permanent wireless communication with lands across the ocean.

It was on the Carlo Alberto, which is equipped with wireless instruments, that Marconi made his recent tests in the Mediterranean.

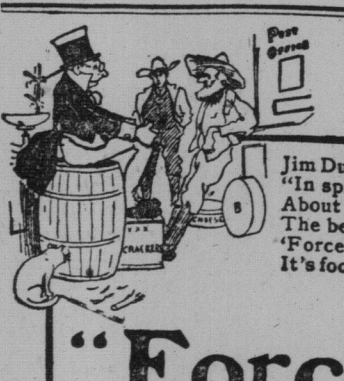
SECRET MARRIAGE DENIED.
