



On April 3, there were 53 farmers at the Union Station, in Toronto, looking for laborers, which they could not get. Wage used to run at from \$12 to \$15 per month and board, but now they get from \$20 to \$30 per month, with house free and cer-tain perguisites, such as a cow, etc., em ployment being given for the year around Netwithstanding this, Ontario is still loos ing ground as regards population. Quebec on the other hand, is increasing in popula-tion, and we are in a fair way to lose turk ther representation at Ottawa. We should have men at Ottawa and in Toronto to look more after the needs of Ontarlo, and see if we cannot induce part of the emi-gration from Great Britan to remain by Ontarbo, and not all go out to Wester Cangara. There are between 50,000 and for the French Canadians from Quebec, bu the majority are looking for men from England, Ireiand and Scotland. In older times, the farmer's sons sought to get away from the farm, but the establishment, of agricultural and dairying schools, etc., has educated them to the fact that farming in a very profitable business, when the lat est and best farming methods are used. Cry for Help is Genuine. "Many men are going into the farming business in Ontario who formerly turned their eyes to other pursuits. This had an effect of increasing the demand for farm laborers, and has tended to make the cri-sis which now exists." Mr. Birwingham read letters from many farmers througe Ontario as to the scarcity of laborers. He closed with a culogism of the farming business in Ontarlo, and cri-tleized the inactivity of the governments in falling to do something to supply the demand. 
