—Capt. Wadmore, wife and family arrived here Saturday.

—City dealers have decided not to raise the price of bread.

—Miss Clara Hill, daughter of Rev. W. T. Hill, lies dangerously ill.

—The large new engine for the street railway power house has been shipped from Providence, R. I.

—Misses May and Lila Broderick are visiting Mrs. E. R. Cameron, Elmwood avenue, South London.

—Manager Carr, of the street railway company, has recovered from a sprained ankle, caused by jumping on a street car.

—Mr. Archie Graham has received a check for \$4,750 in payment for 35,000 square feet of granolithic walk laid at Wingham.

—City delegates to the Anglican Synod at Montreal left today. They are Dean Innes, Canon Richardson and Archdeacon Davis.

—Mr. Fred Moule, brother of Police Court Clerk John Moule, returns to this home in Killarney, Manitoba, to-night. His wife was buried in this city on Monday.

—The steamer Cuba left Port Stanley for Port Dover Saturday morning for a load of apples for Montreal. The Cuba will make another trip this season, if possible.

—At a meeting of the city dentists on Saturday night, Dr. George C. Davis was unanimously chosen as the candidate for No. 7 district for election to the general board of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons. The district includes Middlesex, Lambton, Essex and Kent. A code of ethics was also adopted at the meeting, and by-laws governing the society were drafted.

—Mr. Maxwell Sheppard, of Windsor, has been retained by Mr. Henry Macklin, of this city, one of the defendants in the suit brought by Wm. Harding, of Sandwich, against the officers of the P. E. A. to recover \$500 on paraphernalia, which he supplied to the order some time ago. Mr. Macklin says he will fight the suit, and if he is compelled to pay a share he will have the other officers and members of the association up as co-defendants, as they are equally liable with himself.

—The large new passenger engine, No. 695, of the G. T. R., passed through Toronto on Friday from Montreal to London. Among the improvements with which it has been supplied are what is known as the Balfour fire-box, air bell ringers, and all the latest types of brake mechanism. The steam pressure under which it runs is 190 pounds, which is somewhat above the average engine. The new addition to modern machinery will be run between London and Niagara Falls.

The Deadly Revolver.

An Accidental Shot Deprives Leonard Harding of Life.

Lived but Twenty-Five Minutes After—
"Father, I Have Shot Myself!" His Last and Only Words—A Popular Boy.

Sad and sudden, indeed, was the death of Leonard, the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Harding, of 48 Elizabeth Street. The calamity which deprived the unfortunate lad of life was the accidental discharge of a revolver by himself, about 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Leonard and the other children of the family were in the kitchen, where he was playfully flourishing the revolver. Through some unknown cause, the pistol was discharged, the ball entering his chest and grazing his heart. The boy staggered to the parlour, where his father was sitting, and exclaimed: "Father, I've shot myself!" Then he sank unconscious to the floor. Mr. Harding made all possible haste for Dr. English, who was on hand five minutes after the shooting, but could do nothing, as the youth was past all earthly aid, dying 20 minutes after the doctor's arrival.

The boy was in the employ of A. J. Denny, grocer, and was of a jovial and kindly disposition, liked and spoken highly of by all who knew him. The pistol which did the deadly work was a five-shooter, of small calibre, which four boys owned in the house. The fifth having been the fatal shot.

Leonard had on a previous occasion displayed the revolver, and had been reprimanded by his parents, and told to give it back to whom it belonged, which he was supposed to have done long since. Coroner Ferguson was called, and decided that an inquest was not necessary, it being clearly an accident.

The family will have the deep sympathy of friends and the entire community. Leonard was a popular boy, and very popular with his members.

Daring Thiefs.

Street Car Conductors' Fare Boxes Stolen.

In Full View of Passengers—Conductor and Motorman Give Chase—Pelted With Stones.

The fare boxes on the trolley cars are the latest objects of the sneak thief. Two of them were taken on Saturday night, and both from the same line, which seems to indicate that they were stolen by the same party. The boxes were made of steel, and were worth about \$15 each, and contained, Manager Carr says, about \$12 or \$14. The boxes were new, and would require considerable smashing before being opened.

The first box was taken off Conductor St. Clair's car, as he was in the act of signalling his motorman over the Port Stanley track on Horton Street. There were only two or three passengers on the car at the time, and when the conductor got aboard again he was acquainted with the fact that a man had pelted the box off the end of the rod and slipped away in the darkness.

The second thief occurred about 11 o'clock, while a car was turning the "Y" at Rectory Street and the Hamilton Road. Conductor Griffith and Motorman Fitzgerald were in charge of the car. When the conductor had removed the pole from the wire, the light went out. This was the sneak's opportunity, and, grasping the box, he jumped from the car and ran.

Motorman Fitzgerald saw the deed as he turned to look up his car. He called to the conductor, and the two

Impressions of London.

Recorded by the Assistant Editors of the Bowmanville Statesman.

What She Saw—Her Opinions Generally Favorable to the City.

The assistant editors of the Bowmanville Statesman was a delegate to the recent Sabbath school convention here, and in that paper records her London experiences in an interesting way. She was the guest of Mrs. S. B. Gerry. She first describes a visit to the electric power house, terming it a wonderful sight. "On our way to the first session Tuesday," she adds, "we called at the sulphur baths, and had a drink of sulphur water. Speaking of Dundas Center Methodist Church, she says: "It is splendidly situated, and has a seating capacity of 1,200. The walls of the interior of the edifice are finished in rough plaster, while the ceiling is smooth, and the two are connected by a series of design in plaster Paris. No pillars are to be seen supporting the gallery, and the interior is a very comfortable and home-like church, with a school room attached with all modern improvements. Rev. B. B. Lancelotti may justly feel proud to be pastor of this church and people."

"London is a church-going city, if we may base our conclusions on what we observed on the Sunday we spent there. The fact that so many large and beautiful churches within such a short distance of each other, supported and well attended by citizens of that city, speaks clearly of the character and morals of the people."

"On Sunday we attended the First Methodist Church on Dufferin Avenue. This is the largest church in London. It has a seating capacity of 2,500, and the walls of the interior are finished in whitish colored brick, while the ceilings are finished in a smooth cream colored plaster. The church is carpeted with Brussels carpet, costing about \$2,000. This part of the furnishings, with the upholstering of the chairs, is a terra cotta color, and is very pretty and comfortable looking, indeed."

"In the evening we attended St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church and heard Rev. Robert Johnston, the pastor, deliver a splendid sermon on 'Gideon's Downfall.' We had the privilege of looking through another Presbyterian church whose pastor is Rev. W. J. Clark, who was so popular in Bowmanville, while supplying for Rev. R. D. Fraser in St. Paul's, and whom we learn is quite popular with his London congregation. His church has a very cosy and home-like appearance. We were not privileged with seeing anything more than the outside of St. James' Church, of which Rev. M. P. Tallant, another successful Bowmanville boy, is the esteemed pastor."

"The principal business streets are Dundas and Richmond, which are laid with asphalt. Very few empty streets are to be seen, and all the merchants appear to be doing a thriving business. On Richmond Street may be seen the large wholesale houses, a number of lawyers' offices, printing offices, postoffice and custom house, the two latter being very fine buildings. The public library on Queen's Avenue is a fine building, built in 1885, of red brick, and erected near by of white brick for the Young Men's Christian Association. Among the other buildings

A NOTABLE FUNERAL.

That of Mr. T. W. Standfield—Large Society Parade—A Long Cortege.

The obsequies of the late Mr. T. W. Standfield, who died in Vancouver, B. C., occasioned yesterday afternoon one of the largest society parades and funeral corteges ever seen in London.

The deceased was a notable and popular fraternal man, having been a prominent member of the I. O. O. F., C. O. F., and S. O. E., while resident in London. By his own wish, Choral Lodge, I. O. O. F., of which he was a past noble grand, conducted the funeral ceremonies. The cortege was headed by members of the Canadian Order of Foresters and Sons of England, followed by the Seventh Band, the London Uniformed Canton, and to visit this market and witness the great quantity of vegetables, poultry, butter, eggs, etc., which was displayed for sale. On visiting the market in the afternoon, it was astonishing to find that out of that great throng only one or two were left, the remainder having disposed of their goods, and were either delivering them or doing their shopping."
