London, Dec. 29.-In his peaceful home at Hawarden today, Britain's war, and was subsequently cordially Grand Old Man the Right Hon. Wil-Grand Old Man. the Right Hon. William Ewart Gladstone, celebrated his 87th birthday. The natal anniversary found him in good health and spirits, surrounded by his family, and remem-bered by all his friends in various parts of the world, as well as by his

fellow-townsmen and the English people generally. Throughout the day there was an enormous influx of congratulatory telegrams from all parts of the United Kingdom and from the Continent and the United States. The villagers gave the usual demonstrations in onor of the occasion by ringing the church-bells and assigning deputations to proceed to the castle and give utterance to their congratulations.

Alarmist Rumors Contradicted by Sin James Grant. Ottawa, Dec. 29.-Sir James Grant contradicts the story cabled by Mr. Harold Frederic to the New York Times as to the alarming state of the Queen's health. Sir James, who was physician to the Princess Louise during her residence in Canada, only returned a few weeks ago from a visit to the old country, where he had the honor of a long interview with her Majesty, who evinced much interest in Canada, and kept Sir James in conversation about the country for a considerable time. Asked what impression the Queen's manner made on him, Sir James replied that her mind appeared "wonderfully bright," and then added, with reference to Mr. Frederic's dispatch: "The statements made in the correspondence of the New York paper have little or no foundation. Her Majesty doubtless is experiencing J. Gordon Sprigg, Premier of Cape Colony, regarding the advisability of dispatching the volunteers to the Bemoral. Her mental activity appears seems to take in thoroughly almost everything connected with her vast empire and its people.
