Sudden Demise of Rev. Dr. Cochrane Clerk of the Presbyterian Synod of Hamilton a nd London.

Rev. Dr. Cochrane, pastor of Zion Presbyterian Church, Brantford, and well-known throughout Canada in connection with the Presbyterian Church, died suddenly at 10 o'clock last night 134. MOTHERLESS **AND FATHERLESS**

Good Work Accomplished by the Protestant Orphans' Home.

Annual Meeting of the Managers-Offi cers Elected - Twenty-Five Unfortunates Placed in Homes-Financial Statement.

The board of management of the Protestant Orphans' Home held their 24th annual meeting yesterday afternoon in the Woman's Art Club rooms, over the Free Library. The reports of the various officers showed the work done among the unfortunate children was very gratifying, many having been placed in comfortable foster-homes. The finances were also in good shape.

Mrs. Morphy, president, occupied the chair, and among otherts present were Rev. Ira Smith, Mr. Andrew Thomson, Mr. Wm. Bowman, Dr. J. S. Niven, Mrs. Shuttleworth (secretary), Mrs. Gregsten (treasurer), and many other ladies who take an interest in

the work. The president, Mrs. Morphy, in her report, said that it gave her much pleasure to take part in the work of placing these unfortunate children in good homes, where they would be cared for and educated. Little girls were always in demand, and it was a dist Church, officiating. The house was constant regret that she could not fill prettily decorated with flowers and folithe applications for them. Several age, and was enlivened by the presence bright boys, ranging from 21/2 to 6 of relatives and friends of the conyears, were in the home awaiting adoption. The speaker then expressed given away by her father, looked handher thanks to all who had assisted in

any way during the year. Mrs. Morphy has filled the position of president for nine years, and has always been an efficient and earnest

worker. The lady was accorded a standing vote of thanks. Mrs. Shuttleworth's report as secretary furnished information regarding the admissions, etc., during the year. On Oct. 1, 1897, there remained in the home 21 boys and 5 girls, and in the twelve months 28 boys and 18 girls were admitted, making a total of 49 boys and 23 girls cared for. Thirty-three boys and fourteen girls were in the home on Sept. 30. Sixteen city and fourteen county children were sheltered for the Children's Aid Soclety in the year, seven of them still being occupants of the home. Twentyfive children were placed in homes during the year. All of the children were in good health.

Mrs. Gregsten's report of the finances showed the year's receipts to have amounted to \$3,518 88. Of this \$243 70 was granted by the government, and \$425 by the council, while the keep of the aid society's children netted \$116 75. The city collections realized \$946 47, besides which there was a \$500 bequest by George Dawson, and a number of special donations. After meeting all liabilities there remained a balance of \$15 37 in the treasury. Over \$900 was paid in salaries. The endowment fund receipts amounted to \$2,249 56, made up principally of dividends on bank stock, bequests by the late George Dawson and H. Mathewson, and a balance of \$715 34 from last year. The balance on hand on Sept. 30, was \$1.315 54. The assets were placed at \$36,072 54. The bank stock was valued at \$17,000, and the buildings at \$17,500.

Dr. Niven, the medical attendant of the home, reported that owing to the careful examination of the children before being admitted there had been no infectious diseases during the year, save three cases of diphtheria, at different times, all of which were treated successfully at the city hospital. Some children in an unfit condition, mentally, for the home, had been taken to the Orillia asylum, where they were doing well. Only one death occurred during the years, Mrs. Butler, a faithful attendant, having passed away in February at an advanced age. The election of officers followed the presentation of the reports.
