Men Make Good Their Threat When the Council Rejects Demanded Price.

31 EMPLOYEES WALK OUT

In his address to the grand jury, at the opening of the county court and general sessions of the peace at the court house this afternoon, Judge Talbot Macbeth impressed upon the jury-more reported for work as usual. When they reached the stables, however, they received word that the council last night refused to grant their ten per cent increase in wages, offering in lieu 10 cents a day. This was not satisfactory and they all returned to their homes, thus carrying out their threat to quit if not granted the increase. The result is that the city has 36 horses and nearly as many wagons standing idle today, the wagons to rust, the horses to eat their heads off. Thirty-more men, 29 married and 2 single, are out of work. The means of livelihood of 140 persons has been temporarily halted.

The collectors in their original request asked for a ten per cent increase on \$2.75 a day. This means that they would get \$3.02\% daily. Three dollars was the goal aimed at.
