GERMANY IS STRIPPED OF POWER TO RENEW THE WAR; HITLER TROOPS MUST RETIRE 18 MILES EAST OF RHINE

Teutons Must Surrender Large Part of Fleet, Munitions and War Materials and Make Ample Reparation For Damage Done---Allied Prisoners Must Be Given Up and All Gold and Securities Stolen Must Be Returned as Provided in the Terms of the Armistice.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Terms of the armistice which ends the world-war, because they strip Germany of the power to renew it, were announced by President Wilson today in an address to Congress, assembled in joint session.

Evacuation of all the invaded territories, including Alsace-Lorraine, reparation for all damage done; occupation by Allies' forces of principal gateways to Germany, handing over of the principal units of the German high seas fleet, surrender of enough war materials to practically disarm the German forces, and the occupation by American and Allied forces of strategic gateways to Germany to force the fulfillment of the terms are the principal features.

War Machine "Scrapped." Complete destruction of the German military machine, which brought on the war, is provided for, and the way paved for reparation for the damage it wrought.

Germany must get out of Russia entirely and leave territory now occupied open to the Allies. The map of Europe, during discussion of peace terms, will be restored to the lines of 1914.

Germany must return the thousands of unfortunate slaves deported into slavery from France, Belgium and the other invaded countries; she must return the gold taken from Russia, Rumania and Belgium, and she must make good for the property removed by her troops.

Russia and Rumania Free. The treaty of Brest-Litovsk, which delivered Russia into Germany's hands, is to be abandoned; the "peace" dictated at Bucharest, which prostrated Rumania, is likewise to be abandoned.

American and Allied prisoners of war are to be repatriated without reciprocal action. What German forces remain in East Africa are to surrender unconditionally.

Guns, airplanes and other engines of war, numbered by the thousands, are to be turned over to the associated

governments, with their accoutrements. No further destruction must be wrought by the retreating German hordes, and vast supplies of coal, iron and other war-making materials in the territories they occupy must be handed over undamaged.

No Scrap of Paper. Germany is to pay for the maintenance of the troops the associated governments will place at strategic points in the Rhineland to assure that her promises shall not be a "scrap of paper." German merchant ships are to be handed over undamaged, that they may be put into the humane work of relieving the distress of her civilian population, which the victorious Allies will at once undertake in a spirit of mercy.

In the Black Sea, as well as in the Baltic, the entangled German military machine are to be clipped by the surrender of forts and ships. Everywhere on all the fronts Germany is required to deliver her sword, while the American and Allied troops take positions to enforce her agreement.

Everywhere the great military power is to be reduced to a state of helplessness, a state of helplessness which will in some degree lighten its burden of responsibility to perform in person the

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Foch Puts Clamps on Germany

Immediate evacuation of Belgium, France, Alsace-Lorraine and Luxembourg.

Repatriation of inhabitants of above countries in fourteen days.

Allies to advance to left bank of Rhine, and Germans to retire eighteen miles east of Rhine. Intervening space neutral.

Surrender of 5,000 guns; 3,000 minenwerfers; 30,000 machine guns and 2,000 airplanes.

Germans must destroy nothing nor remove or harm inhabitants in retreating.

Surrender of railways and rolling stock in territory to be evacuated.

Allied prisoners of war to be delivered by Germany; Allies to hold German prisoners.

All German troops must leave Russia—the pre-1914 Russia.

Abandonment of treaties of Brest-Litovsk and Bucharest.

Full reparation for damage done.

Return of money taken from Belgium and all stolen securities.

Restitution of Russian and Rumanian gold yielded to Germany.

German territorial waters to be immediately opened to the world.

Surrender of 160 U-boats, all others to be disarmed and placed where they will be harmless.

Six battle cruisers, ten battleships, eight light cruisers, fifty destroyers to be surrendered; all others to be disarmed and laid up.

Allied occupation of sea forts from Cattagat to Baltic.

Allied naval blockade to remain in effect.

All Russian vessels seized by Germany to be handed to the Allies.

Germans to release all neutral vessels seized.

All Allied merchant ships in German hands must be returned.

Allies reserve right to occupy Helgoland if mutiny interferes with delivery of warships.

Armistice effective for 30 days, with option to extend.

Failure to execute any clause may result in denunciation of armistice on 48 hours' notice.

CLAUSES OF THE ARMISTICE ARE READ BY WILSON TO CONGRESS

Washington, Nov. 11.—The terms of the armistice with Germany were read to Congress by President Wilson at 11 o'clock this afternoon. The president spoke as follows:

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and Luxembourg. The railways, of Alsace-Lorraine shall be handed over within the same period as the other pre-war personnel and material.

Further material necessary for the working of railways shall be placed on the left bank of the Rhine shall be left in situ. All stores of coal and material for the upkeep of permanent ways, signals and repair shops left entire in situ and kept in an efficient state by Germany during the whole period of armistice. All barges taken from the Allies shall be restored to them. A note appended regulates the details of these measures.

MUST DISCLOSE ALL DEATH TRAPS. 8.—The German command shall be responsible for revealing all mines or delay-acting fuses disposed of in territory evacuated by the German troops and shall assist in their discovery and destruction. The German command shall also reveal all destructive measures that may have been taken (such as poisoning or polluting of springs, wells, etc.) under penalty of reprisals.

9.—The right of requisition shall be exercised by the Allies and the United States armies in all occupied territory. The upkeep of the troops of occupied regions in the Rhineland (excluding Alsace-Lorraine) shall be charged to the German Government.

DELIVER ALLIED PRISONERS. 10.—An immediate exchange without reciprocity, according to detailed conditions, which shall be fixed, of all Allied and United States prisoners of war. The Allied powers and the United States shall be responsible for these prisoners as they wish.

11.—Sick and wounded who cannot be removed from the theatre of war will be cared for by German personnel who will be left on the spot with the medical material necessary for their care.

12.—MATERIAL REQUIRED. Disposition relative to the Eastern Frontiers of Germany.

13.—All German troops at present in any territory which before the war belonged to the German Empire, and which shall be withdrawn within the frontiers of Germany as they existed on 1914.

14.—Evacuation by German troops to begin at once and all German instructors, privates, and other personnel, as well as military agents, now on the territory of Russia (as defined before 1914) shall be evacuated.

15.—German troops to cease at once all regulations and seizures, and any other measures of oppression now obtaining supplies intended for Germany, Rumania and Russia (as defined on August 1, 1914).

16.—Abandonment of the treaties of Brest-Litovsk, and of the supplementary treaties, and of the "peace" dictated at Bucharest.

17.—The Allies shall have free access to all ports, harbours, and rivers, and to the population of those territories or for any other purpose.

18.—UNCONDITIONAL CAPITULATION. 17.—Unconditional capitulation of all German forces in the East and Africa within a month.

19.—GENERAL CLAUSES. 18.—Unconditional capitulation, within a maximum period of one month, in accordance with detailed conditions, heretofore agreed upon, of all civilians interned or deported who may be citizens of the Allied or associated states than those mentioned in clause 11, paragraph 10, with the exception of those who are citizens of the States of America.

19.—The following financial conditions shall be observed: a. The German public securities shall be removed by the Allies within a maximum period of one month, in accordance with detailed conditions, heretofore agreed upon, of all civilians interned or deported who may be citizens of the Allied or associated states than those mentioned in clause 11, paragraph 10, with the exception of those who are citizens of the States of America.

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
