MINIMUM WHEAT PRICE TO BE FIXED BY GOVERNMENT LIFTING GERMAN BLOCKADE CAUSES DROP IN FOOD PRICES THERE

EXHIBITION FLYING ABOVE PRESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS TO BE STRICTLY FORBIDDEN

Privy Council Approves Regulations Recommended by the Canadian Air Board—Heavy Penalties Provided For the Violation of Measures Relating To Air Navigation.

Ottawa, July 16.—On the recommendation of the air board the privy council has approved of regulations forbidding exhibition flying over residential districts. The regulations are absolute, and no flying over cities or towns must be at a height which permits the machine to land outside in the event of engine failure. Nothing dangerous must be dropped under any circumstances.

DISCHARGES HIS VOW BY GETTING HIS FIRST HAIRCUT IN 48 YEARS

Montreal, July 16.—For the first time in 48 years J. A. Cholley, a veteran of the Franco-Prussian war of 1870, sat in a barber's chair last week for the cutting of a crop of hair nearly a half century old, and the trimming of a beard that was more than patriarchal. After a sitting of less than half an hour he emerged from the chair with a close clipped head and an imperial after the style of Napoleon III., the last emperor of France. Mr. Cholley had discharged his vow, made in 1871, of never having his hair cut or beard trimmed until France had taken her revenge on Germany.

U. S. SOLDIERS WILL LEAD VICTORY MARCH IN BRITISH CAPITAL

Allied Troops To Parade in Alphabetical Order.
IMPRESSIVE SERVICES
Will Be Conducted At Cathedral Following the March.

London, July 16.—A composite regiment of U. S. soldiers, 350 strong, headed by General Pershing, will lead the great victory march through London on Saturday, July 19, according to the completed program announced last night. The decision to have the Allied troops march in alphabetical order as to nations resulted in the place of honor going to the Americans. The parade will take an unusual route, starting from Hyde Park chiefly, and proceeding along the south side of the Thames. After the Belgian contingent, the French, a thousand strong, will follow, all led by general; then a detachment of Japanese and other Allied representatives. The forces of the British Empire will march behind the Allied contingents. Admiral Sir David Beatty, head of the navy and Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig and other generals will lead the British army, in which all arms will participate, including the women's corps and nurses, all with massed standards and their colors and bands and pipes. The Australians, South Africans and Indian troops will also march in the pageant.

PEARY'S SHIP IS SOLD BY AUCTION

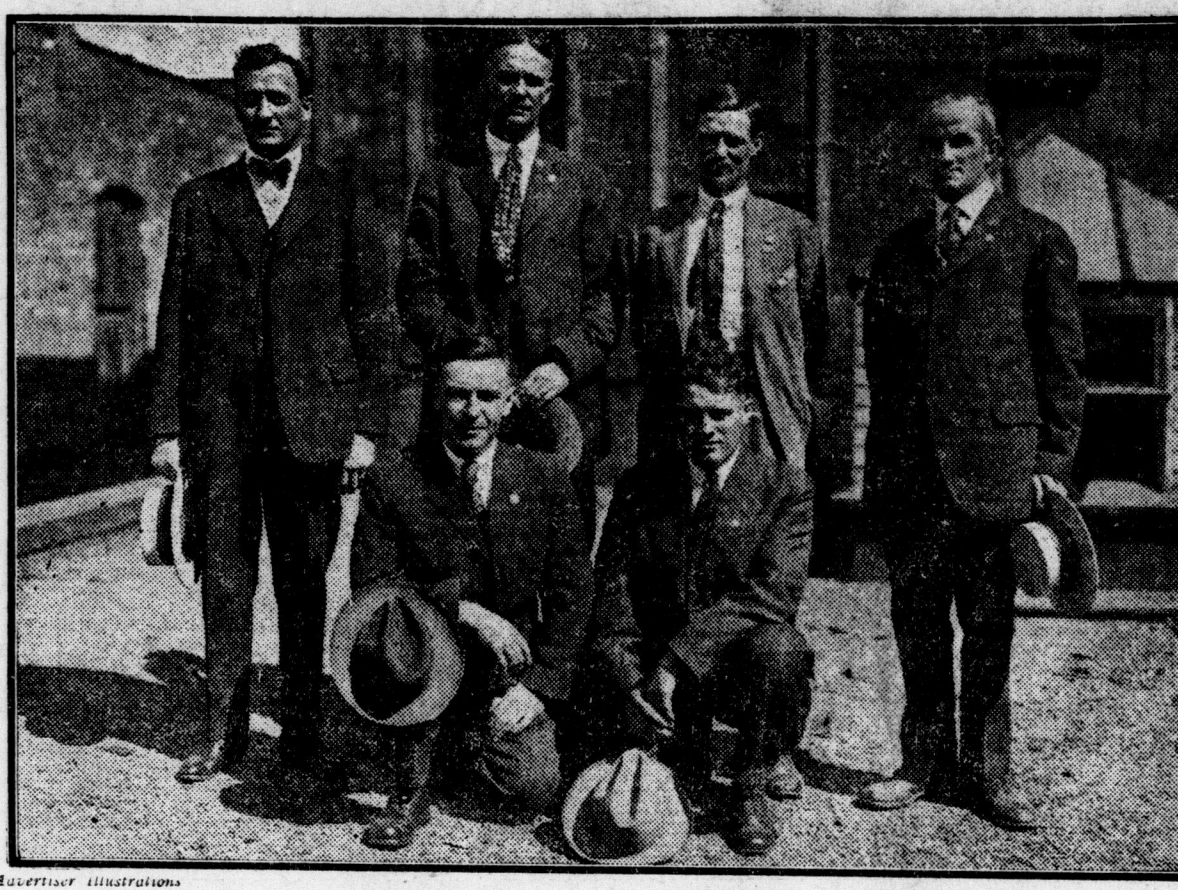

FORD ADMITS HE IS "IGNORANT IDEALIST," THEN RETRACTS IT

Describes Benedict Arnold As Writer, in Answer To Lawyer's Question.

IS CLOSELY EXAMINED
Asked To Define the Words "Traitor and Idealist."

Mount Clemens, Mich., July 16.—In a moment of petulance while on the witness stand today, Henry Ford, plaintiff in a one million dollar libel suit against the Chicago Daily Tribune, admitted that he was "an ignorant idealist." Later when formally asked to retract it, he reversed his statement.

This was one of the alleged libelous charges made against him in the Tribune editorial. Attorney Stevenson, for the Tribune, had been asking questions to establish, if possible, that Mr. Ford, as a matter of fact, was ignorant. The witness said that he made the admission merely to stop the examination. He then said that he was not a writer, as the Tribune had charged, but a manufacturer. American Soldier Not As Well Paid As Many Others

Washington, July 16.—Popular belief in the United States that the American soldier is higher paid than that of any other country is erroneous, according to a general staff. This shows that three British dominions—Canada, Australia and New Zealand—allow materially higher prices for each grade than does the United States. For instance, in the Australian army, a corporal earns \$72.90 per month, as compared to \$36 in the American army.

ST. CATHARINES BAKERS' STRIKE IS SETTLED

St. Catharines, July 16.—The bakers' strike was settled this morning, and all bakers will return to work tonight, and the drivers tomorrow. While the schedule accepted is not up to the maximum demanded, it is in excess of what the master bakers offered and carries with it recognition of the union. The increase in wages averages about eight per cent.

FREED BY EFFORTS OF FRIENDS AND PRESS, VETERANS MARCH OUT OF JAIL TO CELEBRATE PEACE

Visit Office To Express Gratitude For Assistance and Sympathy Given Them—Only Drawback To It All Is That Officials Miss Their Mulligan Kings.

Free to celebrate on Saturday the peace which they did their best to bring about, the five veterans who have been in jail here on account of having transgressed the O. T. A. walked out of the castle by the Thames this morning at 2:45 o'clock, and were not accompanied by town by W. Blathway and A. P. Alford, who had been appointed by the Army and Navy Veterans' League to welcome them back to liberty.

One of the first acts of the men, whose release was ordered by Premier Borden, was to visit the office of the O. T. A. secretary, Mr. Charles Woods, who was in for 17 days; John Dunn, who had five weeks to his credit, and George Gibson, who had only four days to go of his three-month sentence.

The following letter to The Advertiser, written by the five veterans, was published in the paper today. It expressed their gratitude to the O. T. A. for the assistance and sympathy given them during their imprisonment. The letter was signed by Norman Chapman, Tom Murray, John Dunn, W. Blathway and A. P. Alford.

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GOVERNMENT TO FIX MINIMUM WHEAT PRICE

Sir Thomas White Confirms Report of Guarantee.

PRICE IS UNSTATED

Fixing of Lowest Figure Will Facilitate Marketing of Crop.

Ottawa, July 16.—Confirmation was given by Sir Thomas White this morning of the report that a minimum price for wheat will be guaranteed in all probability by the Government. What this price is to be, Sir Thomas would not say.

The intention is to give commercial and financial stability to the marketing of the crop.

In view of unsettled world conditions the unique situation created by the United States fixed price, and the uncertainty as to how world demand would react to the queer conditions now obtaining, capital has been timed in dealing with wheat. The fixing of a price gives a guarantee which will facilitate the placing of the crop, it is hoped.

64TH GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO MASONS OPENS AT TORONTO

Grand Master W. H. Wardrope Absent Because of Illness.

1,100 ARE ATTENDING
Proceedings in Charge of F. W. Harcourt, K. C.

Toronto, July 16.—The 64th annual communication of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Ontario in the Province of Ontario opened in the new temple this morning, approximately eleven hundred delegates attending. Owing to the illness of Grand Master W. H. Wardrope, the proceedings were in charge of F. W. Harcourt, K. C., and W. J. McPherson, K. C.

At the commencement of his address the grand master made special reference to the war, thanking God for the triumph of the allied nations and praying that we may be worthy of the success which has crowned our efforts. BERLIN FOOD PRICES TAKE SUDDEN DROP AS A RESULT OF LIFTING OF BLOCKADE

Huge Supplies of Concealed Stocks Brought Out by Dealers Anxious To Unload Before Goods Are Brought In From Other Countries.

Berlin, July 15.—Prices on all food-stuffs have fallen with a crash in Berlin as a result of the lifting of the blockade. They began to show weakness when it was rumored that the embargo would be lifted, but the real drop came only when illicit dealers with huge concealed stocks brought them out in a virtual panic to unload before competing supplies entering Germany. Tons of provisions are being shipped in from occupied territories, while everywhere in the city great stocks of coffee, cocoa, butter, sausages and other supplies have made their appearance. Coffee prices fell an average of forty marks to below twenty yesterday, and the product could easily be bought for fifteen. Other food prices were correspondingly cut. Restaurants, however, still maintained absurdly high prices, and apparently intend to continue to do so as long as possible.

CROPS ARE FAILURE IN ONE- FIFTH OF SASKATCHEWAN

Provisions Will Have To Be Made To Supply Feed For Stock and Seed For Next Spring—C. P. R. Will Provide Work For Farmers in Affected Area.

Regina, Sask., July 15.—In about one-fifth of Saskatchewan the crop is a failure, and many of the people in the affected area will need feed for themselves and their stock and seed next spring.
