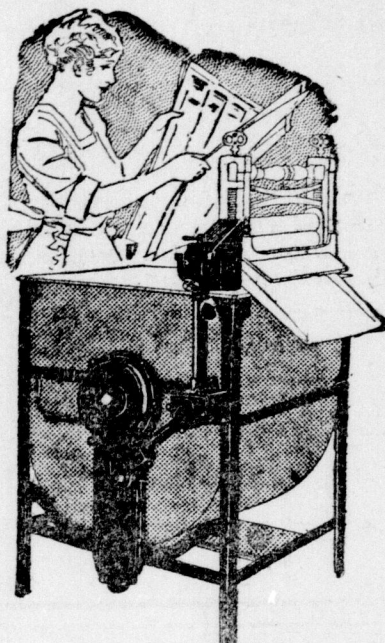

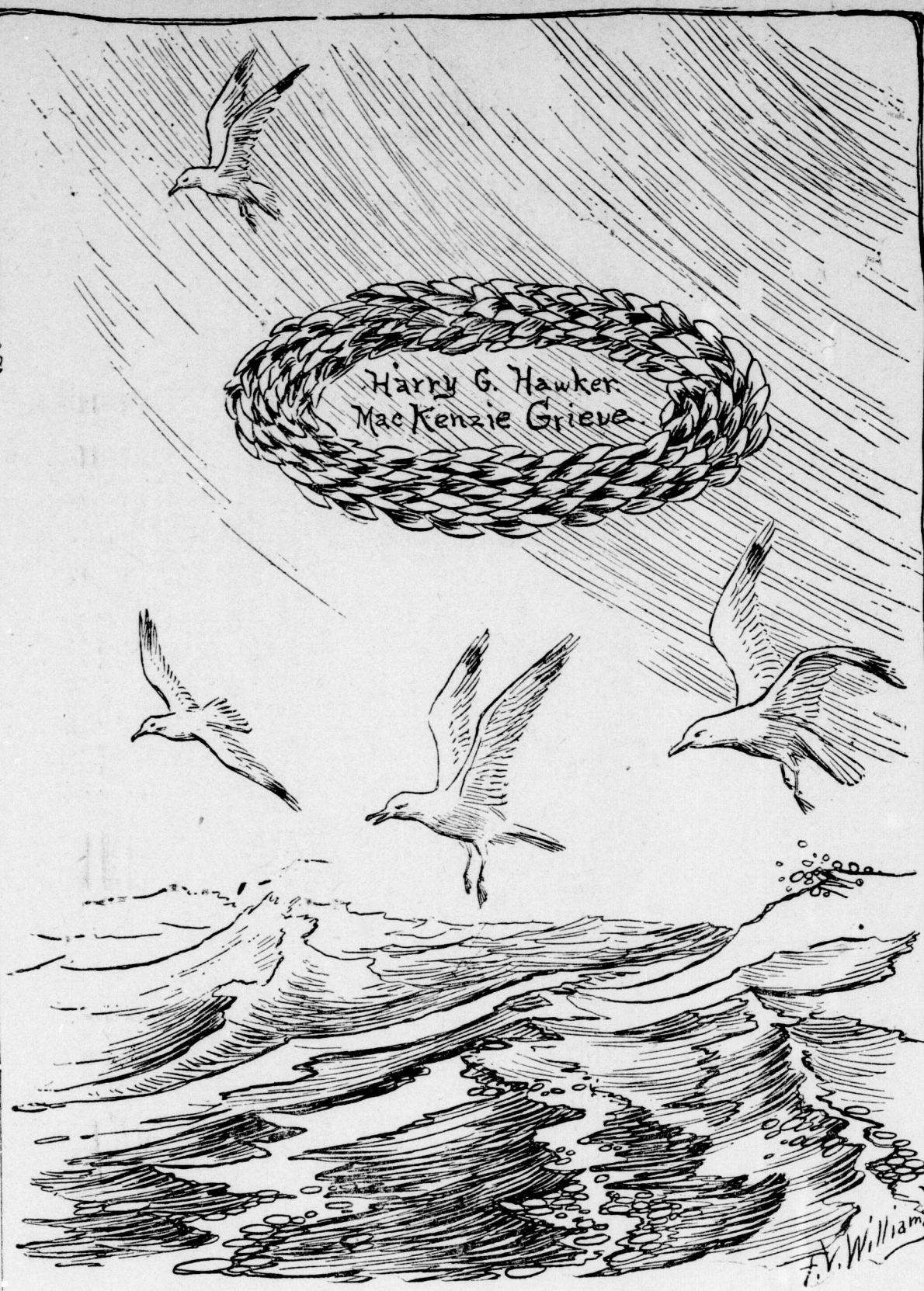

THE LOCAL MARKET

On the local market today a full was felt, but it is expected that tomorrow will see much more activity, as the big market day of the week will be on that day instead of Saturday, the holiday. The country stages and the country storekeepers will bring produce to the city on Friday instead of Saturday. A few loads of hay sold at prices ranging from \$20 to \$24.

LIVE STOCK.

Toronto, May 21.—The cattle market at the Union stockyards this morning was barely steady, and trade continues slow. The principal demand is for light butchers and good to choice cows. Bulls are hard to sell. Calves were firm and sheep and lambs steady. Hogs were much firmer. Receipts, 920 cattle, 107 calves, 1,050 hogs and 81 sheep. Quotations:

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PLUCKY GIRL CLERK IN AGINCOURT BANK PREVENTS ROBBERY

Daring Attempt At Daylight
Hold-Up Is Frustrated.

MEN ARE ARRESTED

Manager of Bank and Two
Would Be Robbers in
Hospital.

Agincourt, May 21.—Gunsplay featured a daring holdup at the Agincourt branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia yesterday noon, and Robert Laing, manager of the bank; F. J. Putnam, aged 27, and Harold Gordon Boyes, aged 19, are in the General Hospital suffering from wounds. Putnam and Boyes, both of whom live on Selby street, are under arrest on a charge of attempted robbery. Mr. Laing was shot through the abdomen, just above the right groin; Putnam through the left eye, and Boyes in the chest, leg and ankle. Putnam was arrested on the bank premises, where he had fallen when shot by Mr. Laing, and Boyes was caught at the home of Putnam's brother-in-law, Harry Dawson, 158 Curzon street, last night. Putnam's parents live on Collier street. Mr. Laing has been operated on, and the bullet has been extracted from the abdomen. The bullet had penetrated three inches into the body. Constable Hobbs is keeping guard over Putnam, and the other two men are being held out for the recovery of Putnam, and the hospital authorities are non-committal regarding the chances of Mr. Laing.

Shots Fired Together.
No sooner was Mr. Laing's back turned, she said, "than the man meaning Putnam—dashed across the room, picked up a chair, placed it near my cage, climbed upon it, and attempted to get over the top. I looked up, alarmed, and saw in his hand a long-barreled revolver. I shouted to Mr. Laing: 'Look out! He's got a gun.' Mr. Laing immediately snatched up a revolver kept in the vault for emergencies, and whirled upon the robber. Two shots rang out simultaneously, one from Mr. Laing's gun the other from that held by the robber. Mr. Laing staggered, and the robber tottered over toward the wall behind the cage, striking his head heavily against the wall, and slumping down on the floor. The second man, who had followed his companion, immediately darted for the vault, intending to make for the vault. Mr. Laing fired. I saw the robber hold

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WALL STREET.

New York, May 21.—Wall Street, 10:30 a.m.—Shipments were naturally the central feature at the outset of today's session, because of yesterday's announcement of the virtual sale of the Mercantile Marine Company's English tonnage. Marine common opened with three separate transactions of 200, 4,000 and 5,500 shares at an extreme decline of 5%, followed by a 2-point rally, while the preferred gained almost 2 points.

Other striking features included American International, Atlantic Gulf, Ohio, Chicago Gas, leading oils, Studenker, Pittsburgh Coal and equipments, at gains of 1 to 2 points. Rails and steels were fractionally higher.
