SAYS WAR WON BECAUSE UNION GOVT. IN POWER

Dr. Michael Clark Implies
Even Vote Manipulation
Justified.

DEFENDS MEIGHEN

Second Monday in November
For Thanksgiving Instead
of November 11.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—When the House assembled this afternoon Mr. Pedlow's bill regarding Thanksgiving Day came up for third reading and an amendment by Mr. McMaster and Mr. McKay to restore the original intention of the bill and make Thanksgiving Day the second Monday in November instead of the first Monday in October was carried by 78 to 34 on a nonparty vote. Then Dr. Michael Clark moved a six months' holiday for the bill as amended and that carried by 78 to 73.

Mr. McMaster then resumed the debate on Mr. McKenzie's motion for investigation by a parliamentary committee into the alleged manipulation of soldier votes in the last election. Mr. McMaster said that Mr. Meighen had not only denied paternity of the telegram to Sir Robert Borden, but had said that it was a perfectly proper and honorable telegram.

The telegram and the admissions made by Mr. Meighen yesterday, declared Mr. McMaster, showed very plainly that there was a widespread system of manipulation of votes for the purpose of defeating the will of the Canadian people. He thought the telegram was illegal, improper and touched the honor of public men in the country.

How Was It Done?
Mr. McMaster asked how the Government had decided what to do with these "votes at large" to which reference had been made. Did they sit around the campfire and decide it themselves, or was a special committee of the cabinet formed to deal with them, and was Hon. Arthur Meighen chairman of that committee? Properly worked out, declared Mr. McMaster, this scheme of placing soldiers' votes where they were needed would have made the election absolutely sure for the Government. If there were one hundred doubtful constituencies the Government had simply to allot one hundred and twenty votes to each. Such a suggestion turned the whole election into a veritable farce.

With regard to taking the vote overseas, Mr. McMaster asked how it was possible to maintain the sanctity and secrecy of the ballot box if a man was instructed or requested to vote a certain way, that officer was going to find out whether the man had done so. The real traitor to his country, Mr. McMaster added, was the man who would lay his hands on the free-will of the elector.

Dr. Clark of Red Deer thought it was unfortunate for Parliament and unfortunate for the country that the resolution should have been brought before the House. Neither side in the old parties of the country, he said, had been over-particular about the question of electoral purity. He cited a statement which he said Sir Wilfrid Laurier had made in 1906 in reference to illegals at the London by-election.

Sir Wilfrid then said, declared Dr. Clark, that no great mistake would be made if the Grits could undertake to fight the enemy with the devil's fire.

The motive of the debate, Dr. Clark went on, was not the public good. It was a scheme of placing soldiers' votes where they were needed to win the election. The Opposition was unfortunate in the personality of the minister they had chosen to attack. In the speeches he had made in the House, Dr. Clark said, Mr. Meighen had never stopped to hit below the belt. "I never knew him in debate make use of a personal remark," Dr. Clark said, "and now he has to argue a case except on its merits."
