DEEPER WELLAND CANAL

Proposal Has Active Support of Municipalities.

The proposition to deep the Welland Canal will have the active support of the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Navigation and Improvement Association, which will at an early date send a deputation to interview the Dominion Cabinet and press for an appropriation in aid of the work. A decision to take such action was arrived at yesterday morning at a meeting for organization. A committee was appointed to issue a circular for distribution among the boards of trade, calling attention to the aims of the association and asking for support in their efforts for a deeper canal.

Among the municipalities represented were: Toronto, Hamilton, Kingston, St. Catharines, Belleville, Prescott and Thorold.

PRINCIPAL EMBREE TO BE SUPERVISOR

Proposal in Direction of Creation of New Office—Changes in School Staff.

Toronto High School principals are to be put under direct supervision by transforming the senior principal into a supervising principal. Principal Embree as senior principal is in line for the work. The proposition which was accepted by the management committee of the board of education yesterday is in the ultimate direction of an appointed supervising principal. This would mean the creation of a new office. Trustee Davis, who fathered the proposition, stated that he had at present only in mind empowering the senior principal to take the initiative where supervising was required.

R. A. Gray, mathematical teacher at Jarvis-street Collegiate, was promoted to the position of principal of East Toronto, as successor to Principal French, resigned.

The high school principals will be asked to report on the provision of accommodation for the teaching of manual training and domestic science as optional subjects.

Superannuation Question.
The resignation of Miss S. Noble, teacher of domestic science at Queen Alexandra school, caused a tilt between trustees. The chairman of the committee favored the usual superannuation allowance of \$250. Miss Noble's resignation was owing to a desire to devote her whole time to the care of her mother. Trustees Leves and Davis opposed the grant of an allowance until the whole question of superannuation was dealt with. Dr. Brynne and Chairman Rawlinson put in a plea for this case to be allowed to be added to those which had this year preceded it. The resignation was accepted and final action on the grant deferred.

The vacancy caused by the resignation of Principal Bruce of Huron-street school to the position of fourth inspector was filled by the appointment of G. H. Armstrong of Dovercourt.

Trustee Leves, in discussing the qualifications of teachers, said all kindergarten directresses should be musicians who can play the piano.

Inspector Hughes said he had intimated to applicants that hereafter they must be of the Bloor Street Site.

The sub-committee of the board of education on a vote of three to two decided to recommend the acceptance of \$70,000 for the Bloor-street site from Mrs. Millican, representing St. Paul's Church congregation.

The offer of G. Pepper for the arena company had been increased to \$90,000. The lower offer contained the proviso that the board of education would have the option to repurchase the property within three years.

The vote for the Millican offer was Trustees Rawlinson, Houston, and Smith. For the arena company offer Trustees Simpson and Dineen.

The question will now go to the next meeting of the board.

HAILEYBURY OPPOSES T. & N.O.

Citizens Claim Proposed Spur Will Destroy Waterfront.

Decided opposition arose at the meeting of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board yesterday to the proposed application of the Toronto and Northern Ontario Railway to construct a spur from the present line, a mile and a half along the waterfront. The citizens of the town objected, alleging that the proposed line would destroy the lake front, and Engineer P. A. Semerville was asked to show plans which showed an alternative route.

D. E. Thomson, K.C., appeared for the railway, and contended that no other satisfactory route was available. For the Nipissing Central Railway, S. Alfred Jones stated that this line, now said to be under construction, would serve the purpose of the spur that is to connect with Lake Timiskaming, and also questioned the jurisdiction of the board to grant the extension of a street already covered by a franchise.

Finally, Chairman Lettich, with the consent of counsel, adjourned the hearing until September 20 at Haileybury, when the board will make an inspection of the waterfront.

MORAL REFORMS COUNCIL

Preparing Campaign in Support of Criminal Code Amendments.

The Dominion Council of Moral and Social Reform will meet this morning at the Methodist Board Room, at the Wesley Building. The chief business before the council will be the formulating of a plan of campaign to arouse the public on various changes in the criminal code desired by the council.

The council, including representatives of the various religious denominations and the Dominion Trades Council. The Methodist and Presbyterian delegations held separate committee meetings yesterday afternoon to prepare their propositions for to-day's meeting.

Fined for Whiskey Adulteration.
Persons who adulterate liquor and deceive the public by refilling bottles are receiving summary treatment by the provincial license department. Yesterday, Eudo Saunders, chief license officer, was advised that out of six charges for refilling bottles, four pleaded guilty and two will be tried to-day. The penalty in case of conviction ranges from \$20 to \$50.

Alaska Central to Be Sold.
The Alaska Central Railway will be sold by auction at Valdez, Alaska, on Oct. 9. The defunct Sovereign Bank was amongst the heaviest bondholders, and it was the railway that caused the downfall of the bank.

WEATHER MAN MOVES NEW HOME IS A MODEL

Observatory on Bloor Street Has Concrete Roof and Other Unique Features.

The weather man has moved to the new observatory at Devonshire-place and Bloor-street. This morning's forecasts are issued from the new quarters, in which the telegraph and printing departments were also installed yesterday afternoon. The moving will be completed by the end of the week.

The new building, in addition to a handsome and substantial exterior, boasts an interior arrangement which would be hard to be surpassed either for convenience or safety.

A unique feature is the solid concrete roof, which is covered externally with red tiling. It is said to be the first of its kind in Canada. There is nothing to burn except the doors and furniture.

Handy communication between the different parts of the building is afforded by a pneumatic tube system, operated by a motor in the basement, where also the seismograph is installed, with the photo-recording barometer and the stenotyping and printing departments where the weather maps are turned out.

On the main floor are the forecast room and the office of the director, R. F. Stupart; the secretary, F. F. Payne, and the computer, W. F. Davidson.

The first floor has the library, telegraph room, instrument room and the offices of the photographer, Jas. Young, the climatologist, H. V. Payne, and the astronomer, A. L. McKee.

The attic is used as a storage room and is at present filled with the books comprising the library of the observatory.

The dome, thru which the telescope will look when it is mounted, is copper covered and weighs five tons, but is easily revolved by one person.

The transit apparatus is situated in a separate building, which has been a room now for over twenty years. The building contains a complete machine shop in which all necessary repairs and outfitting are done.

The director, R. F. Stupart, is at present on a tour of inspection and will return about the end of the month.

KINCAID-SMITH IS HERE

Tells of His Recent Election Fight at Stratford.

Capt. Malcolm Kincaid-Smith, ex-M. P. for Stratford-on-Avon, England, was a visitor at the parliament buildings and called upon Sir James Whitney yesterday. He bore the distinguished part of being one of the opponents of "fighting" Joe Martin in the three-cornered contest in which Sir Stevelay Foster was successful.

Capt. Kincaid-Smith was sitting member until the time of the election, when he resigned to run as an independent Liberal candidate in favor of compulsory service in the new territorial army.

The budget was the important issue in the campaign," he said to The World. "I resigned my seat to make compulsory service the issue. It is an issue that will have a profound effect on the election. There is nothing to be gained by it."

Mr. Kincaid-Smith said Mr. Martin is an effective platform speaker, but he went into the campaign late and was practically unknown.

Capt. Smith is the guest of William Mackenzie while in Toronto. He will leave on Saturday for the city of Quebec, and go later to the west and thence to Australia.

PRIESTS SUSPENDED

Twenty-Six Who Disobeyed Superiors Are Being Punished.

MONTREAL, Sept. 9.—When the Roman Catholic College at Mariville, Que., was under the management of the priests in charge desired to remove St. John's, but the Bishop of St. Hyacinthe refused permission. An appeal to Rome has no beneficial effect, so the college authorities moved without the necessary authority, and the bishop has placed Canon Lemieux, a relative of the postmaster-general, and the 25 priests in the hands of the suspended list. They are not permitted to have any clerical communication with the faithful, and are debarred from all priestly functions.

Eastern Entrance.

Manager Fleming had a conference with Mayor Oliver yesterday with regard to an eastern entrance to the exhibition. Mr. Fleming expressed the opinion that the Bathurst-street route would be preferable. When Chairman Mabee of the Dominion Railway Commission returned Mr. Fleming intends to ask for an order allowing the construction of an additional bridge at Bathurst-street, for street railway tracks only. An expert will report on various sites in the meantime.

Assessment Stays.
Ex-Controller Hubbard appealed to the court of revision yesterday against the assessment of \$40 a foot on 60 feet of land he owns at 660 Broadview-avenue. He purchased the land three years ago at \$20 a foot and contends that the assessment should be reduced as nearby land is assessed by the acre. The court refused to reduce the assessment, but took \$200 off the \$400 on Mr. Hubbard's building. Frederick L. Hubbard, son of the ex-controller, appealed against an assessment of \$200 on his land at 682 Broadview-avenue, but the court refused to make any reduction.

Shot His Brother-in-Law.
BURYTON, N.Y., Sept. 9.—Charles Roth, 22 years old, of Blandell, Erie County, heard some one trying to raise a rear window of his mother's home shortly after midnight this morning. He fired thru the window. When he went outside, he found his brother-in-law, George Pyne, stretched on the ground with a bullet hole in his temple. Pyne had recently been released from the penitentiary and had made life miserable for his wife and the neighbors.
