Rev. A. S. Vining the Choice—Sudden Death of Sister Bascilla—Picked Up by the Police.

HAMILTON, Dec. 1.—(Special.)—The James-street Baptists this evening decided to extend a call to Rev. A. J. Vining, Talbot-street Baptist Church, London. There were only some 230 present out of a congregation of 800. The vote in favor of Mr. Vining was 180 to 50.

WHO MAY VOTE ON TUBES

Seventy Thousand Citizens Will Be Fully Qualified.

There seems to be some uncertainty as to who are entitled to vote on the tube referendum to be submitted on the first of January. An impression exists in many quarters that it is a money bylaw which is going to the people.

The fact is that a simple expression of opinion is being sought, and all persons in the following classes are fully qualified to pass their verdict:

1. The owner of a house or land assessed at \$400 or over.
2. The tenant of a house assessed at \$400 or over.
3. A person whose income is assessed for \$400 or over. (In the case of an unmarried man his income is exempt to the extent of \$600 and of a married man \$1000.)

The voting privilege belongs to spinsters and widows, who are qualified as above.

There will be about 85,000 names on the voters' list this year, of these probably 70,000 will be qualified to vote on the referendum.

Quebec Judgeships.
MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—(Special.)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier has given the Montreal bar to understand that the vacancies in the superior court of this province will be filled without delay. It is understood that Mr. Ethier, M.P. for Two Mountains, will replace the late Judge Rochon in Pontiac. As soon as Hon. W. A. Weir is appointed to replace Judge Curran, it is said J. C. Walsh, ex-M.P. for St. Ann's, will be made judge of sessions here.

WON'T AFFECT LEGISLATION.
Hon. Mr. Fielding Will Ignore Montreal Judgment.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—(Special.)—The bill to bring into effect the Franco-Canadian trade treaty was given its third reading to-day.

A. S. Melgish (Portage-la-Prairie) introduced a bill to amend the railway act amending three clauses to extend the liability of railways, regarding failure to comply with the regulations in respect to fences and cattle guards.

The total amount expended to date by the government in connection with the Quebec tercentenary celebration is \$200,000.

JOHN LATHAM KILLED IN DAVIES' BRICK YARD

Mass of Clay Weighing 500 Pounds Falls Into Pit, Crushing His Head.

While excavating in a pit of the Don Valley Brick Yards yesterday afternoon, John Latham, aged 28, was instantly killed by a mass of blue clay which gave way and rolled down into the pit, crushing his head.

Latham went out of the pit to examine the bank before continuing his work with the pick. He regarded it as safe to return to the pit, and as he stooped to examine some material the mass broke in two and a chunk weighing 500 to 600 pounds, fell on him, crushing his life out.

Dr. C. H. Cameron, made an investigation of the circumstances and decided that an inquest was unnecessary. Latham leaves a wife and two children.

Suicides With Laudanum.
Leaving a note dated "Saturday," in which he declared that he could live no longer in this life, for "reasons best left unsaid," John B. Wiseman, a single Scotchman, 35 years of age, succeeded yesterday afternoon by taking a quantity of laudanum.

Wiseman roomed at 86 Sherbourne-street, and was discovered at 2 o'clock this afternoon in an unconscious condition in his room. The bottle which had contained the drug was found nearby and the note was open upon the table. Mrs. James Beckett, his landlady, informed the police and he was rushed in the ambulance to St. Michael's Hospital, where he died without regaining consciousness.

The not read. "Please cable my brother, James Wiseman, in care William Wiseman & Son, 205 Rutherglen-road, Glasgow, Scotland, for money to pay cremation expenses, should my end come. 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ANGLICAN CONVENTION
Ends With Stirring Addresses in Convocation Hall Last Night.

"Sanctification and service," was the subject treated by the speakers at the Anglican convention for the deepening of the spiritual life, in Convocation Hall last night.

Rev. Canon Tucker took occasion to dissect various kinds of church ideals. Some would make religion a sort of "pullman car," to take men comfortably into heaven. The ideal of the church as a repository of the faith treated it as if it were a fortress. The true ideal was that of an advancing, irresistible host, not merely a garrison in the midst of a citadel. Where there was no offering of life, the church might have a name to name, but it was only a name.

At the afternoon meeting in the Guild Hall addresses were delivered by Revs. Canon Mecklen, Floyd W. Tompkins and Canon Hague, on "sanctification, what it is." Bishop Farrington of Montreal preached in St. James Cathedral in the morning on "The Holy Ghost, the Sanctifier."
