Ottawa, May 26,—The bank statement for April, issued by the finance depart-ment today, shows a continued increase in savings' bank deposits. They now stand at the new high level of 1269 million dollars, as compared with 1070 millions by the banks showed a decrease during the month, while there was a slight increase in deposits in the gold reserve. Call loans, in Canada, were rather lower than shown in the statement for March. Current loans in Canada are about twenty-five millions higher. The principal figures are:




