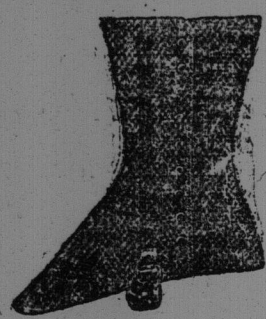

**LATE LOCALS**

St. John Exhibition, September 12th to September 19th.

The Norwegian steamer Vitalia, Captain Bryde, sailed today for Chatham, N. B., with 800 tons of sulphur for the pulp mills at that place.

William Foren, aged 38, was arrested for drunkenness on Sydney street at 10 o'clock this morning by Policeman Belyes and Special Officer Stachhouse.

Again the Schwartz-Fingold assault case has been deferred and on this occasion the day appointed is Monday. Illness of the complainant is represented as the cause of the procrastination.

In the barn of F. E. Williams & Co., a cat gave birth this week to five kittens which were all joined together in a manner that reminded one of the famous Siamese twins. The freaks lived only a few days.

The body of John Graham of Milford, was taken to Hampton today for interment on the 11 o'clock train. Rev. Father Collins read the burial service at St. Rose's Church.

The funeral of Thomas Tyner was held at 2:30 from his daughter's residence, 8 Haymarket Square to the Church of England, burying ground, where interment took place. Rev. Mr. Howard officiated at the obsequies.

Mike (Twin) Sullivan leaves for Cambridge tomorrow evening on the Calvin Austin. Mike has been here several weeks taking a vacation which he enjoyed thoroughly. He will start in training in a day or two at Riverside Boat Club, Cambridge, to get in shape to meet Jimmie Gardner at the National Club in New York on October 2.

A man, who called himself G. Phillips, has disappeared, leaving many anxious creditors, from whom he borrowed sums of money. He arrived here recently, and immediately opened quarters in the Bank of Montreal building and engaging space in several newspapers, proceeded to advertise "Tontine" tea. He procured loans from lawyers and merchants, who believed him to be financially strong.

The police are determined to enforce the law respecting carriage drivers who stand their vehicles in other quarters than on the north side of King Square, the section appointed for them by the mayor.

Policeman Rose has reported Vincent Caples for standing his horse and carriage on King street and refusing to comply with the officer's request to depart and Policeman Stevens has laid information Walter Moore for the same offence.

Charles Cain failed to appear in court this morning to substantiate the accusations and complaint he preferred yesterday against Alex. Chisholm, whom he alleged approached him from the rear and threw him to the ground inflicting several bruises. Chisholm had D. Stewart, in whose chowder shop the dispute originated in court to testify, but his services were not required.

Cain was liberated from jail last Saturday after promising to amend his habits.

Shortly after 10 o'clock last night on Main street, William Fitzpatrick, a conductor in the employ of the street railway, was thrown from a rapidly moving car by a sudden jolt striking the road on his head and rendering him unconscious. Blood flowed freely from a wound on his head and he was first thought that his skull was fractured, but on examination in McMillin's pharmacy it was ascertained that the injury was nothing more serious than a severe gash and after the wound was dressed, Fitzpatrick was conveyed to his home on Duke street.

Friends of Jere McAliffie, the well-known theatrical manager, will be pleased to learn that his son, Eugene McAliffie, who was the victim of an accident at the Union depot some weeks ago, by which he lost a limb is progressing toward recovery at the hospital. Mr. McAliffie has rented a house at 108 Orange street and in the future will direct his business from this city. A benefit entertainment for Eugene McAliffie will be given in the Opera House on October 9 and 10 and the McAliffie company will go on the road shortly after that. They are booked at the Opera House for Christmas week.

**POLICE COURT**

John McDade faced two charges this morning, namely, drunkenness and resisting the police. He said he arrived from McAdam yesterday and after drinking three glasses of ale felt dizzy, but did not recollect resisting Policeman Boves and Special Officer Adams who took him into custody late last night. He produced \$5 and a ticket to McAdam, but when informed that he was liable to a fine of \$80 he signed as he resumed his seat on the bench.

Chester Singer, charged with wandering on Union street at half-past one this morning said he departed from his brother's house on Frederick street at 10 p.m., to visit a friend who resided in the vicinity of Little River and was returning to the schooner P.P.S. when accosted by Officer Marshall.

Both McDade and Singer were allowed their liberty after being cautioned.

John Covenor and Sarah Corrigan forfeited deposits for inebriation. Louis Kerr, a lively stable owner, who was summoned to court to answer a complaint for permitting his horse to wander on King square early yesterday morning and injure the grass and flower beds, said the animal managed to escape from surveillance while being watered and disappeared from sight down Charlotte street.

Officer Marshall was instructed to ascertain from Gardiner Bouttery the amount of damage inflicted and report thereon.

Michael Kelly, who has been in jail on remand for three days, was fined \$8 or two months this morning and two others, Frank Lavigne, the French boy, and Joseph London were again remanded. Kelly entreated the magistrate to extend him his freedom declaring he was not intoxicated on Sunday, but the appeal was futile, his honor remarking that if he changed his name to Wong Sing the next time he was arrested his pleadings might meet with more success. Kelly was asked if he was one of the number of South End loafers who are walking barrooms on Sundays, but this he indignantly denied.

**STMR. CALVIN AUSTIN DELAYED BY STORM**

She Met Very Heavy Weather Along the New England Coast ---Capt. Pike to Take River Trip.

The steamer Calvin Austin, Captain Pike arrived in port this morning somewhat late from Boston direct. The steamer left on time, but met a stormy north-east gale off Boston Light and from that to Martinique it was very rough, which made the steamer late arriving here.

The gale all along the New England coast yesterday was very severe and a great many steamers and sailing vessels are overdue at Boston and other ports.

The Austin had 156 passengers among them was Superintendent Pierce and Captain O'Neill, of the Boston police force also George Tarbell and Colonel Taft, all of Boston, who with Chief Engineer J. H. Smith and Captain Pike went up the St. John river, as the guests of Stephen Gerow in his yacht Lolita. The party will go up as far as John O. Vanvarde and the vessel where there will present Captain Gerow with a beautiful silk flag as a token of their friendship. The party will remain here tomorrow and take passage in the Austin for Boston.

**CHATHAM NEWS**

Chatham, N. B., Sept. 18 (Special).—Nearly all the firemen have left and the fire department is very short of men. They afforded citizens many diversions and expressed themselves as having had a good time.

Several false fire alarms rung in during their stay were laid to their door and the hotels became places of regular vaudeville entertainment. The attendance is still keeping up well at the exhibition. The figures to date are: Monday, opening night, 2,228; Tuesday, 2,320; Wednesday, 2,133; Thursday, 2,191, total 7,880. Today is children's day and large numbers are now attending. The firemen's sports and horse races attracted over 4,500 people.

**BOY STOLE PAPERS**

Wilfred Penny a nine year old boy, was arrested this morning for stealing bundles of newspapers from the doorways of several stores in the South End and also private residences. For some time storekeepers and subscribers have been complaining to the offices of the morning papers that their papers have been missing from the vestibules where they are usually distributed and to make an example of one of the offenders young Penny was lodged in the central police station being apprehended in the act of pilfering a parcel of Telegraphs from the vestibule of a Chatham street.

The boy admitted his guilt to the magistrate amid his sobs and implicated others. He was remanded until this afternoon when his mother was present.

**AGED WOMAN ARRESTED**

Sarah Corrigan probably the oldest woman in local police annals to be arrested for drunkenness failed to answer the allegation in court this morning and her deposit of \$8 was forfeited. The woman is seventy-two years of age and was seen by Policemen Rankin and Merrick on Chapel street last evening in a disgraceful plight. A degrading spectacle was witnessed by the hundreds who congregated around the unfortunate female on the journey to the North End police station where she was lodged in a cell after the "human patrol wagon" had accomplished their task in conveying their prisoner.
