To Enforce The Prohibitory Law

League Organized At Public Meeting Last Evening
REV. W. R. ROBINSON, PRESIDENT
Four Hundred Members Enrolled in Organization Which Will Aid in Enforcement of the New Legislation

The Prohibition Enforcement League was formally organized last night in the St. John Opera House at a mass meeting attended by some 600 people, 400 of whom enrolled as members of the league. Rev. W. R. Robinson was elected its president. Several brief speeches were made urging co-operation in carrying out the rigid enforcement of prohibition with Rev. W. D. Wilson, traveling secretary of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, as the chief speaker. Lieut.-Col. P. A. Guthrie made a brief recruiting speech.
In taking up the matter of enforcement of the liquor law, which becomes effective here May 1, Mr. Wilson said that the present situation is too complex a one to be dealt with in an ordinary way. The Germans were not the country's greatest enemy, declared the speaker, but liquor, and the sooner it was taken out of the reach of the young men the sooner will some mothers be more willing to let their sons go to the front, knowing they will die sober.
Speaking from the standpoint of the city, Mr. Wilson asked whether it could consider it a good business investment to receive as a revenue from seventy liquor places of \$28,000 a year, and then to pay out in grants for charitable and other similar organizations made necessary largely through the liquor traffic, the sum of \$75,000.
Success in P. E. Island.
Mr. Wilson said that prohibition had been made a success in Prince Edward Island and could be made just as much a success in New Brunswick if the proper, capable and zealous officers were appointed. He told how in Charlotte-town the number of arrests for intoxication during the last year of liquor law of 1,200 had been reduced to 98 for the first year of prohibition. To the door of the saloons he laid the responsibility of 82 per cent of the suicides and, in closing, he asked that the people of St. John lend every possible assistance to prevent men from putting stuff into their stomachs to total away their health and to eliminate to a great extent a large part of the poverty.
He further urged the people to stand squarely and heartily in favor of prohibition in the eyes of the world, to aid in the work of organization, because if clean, her judiciary pure and her citizens moral, she can some day be the best.

Cil, spoke along the same lines and brought out the fact that the people should make the province more than a dry province for the boys who are to return from the trenches, and moved a resolution that the meeting go on record as urging upon the government the vital importance of placing the task of enforcement in capable hands, and that an enforcement league be organized to strengthen the hands of the government and its officers in the performance of their duty. This was unanimously passed.
Mayor Hayes, who presided at the meeting, then asked that cards for enrollment in the league be passed among the audience, and about 400 were returned. Upon it being moved that officers be elected the names of Rev. David Hutchinson, Captain Potter and J. Willard Smith were nominated for president, it was felt that the names of Mr. Smith was in ill health and not in the city and probably would not be for a few months, his name was withdrawn. Owing to the pressure of other affairs, Dr. Hutchinson felt obliged to decline. With two candidates withdrawn, only Captain Potter was in the field. Rev. W. R. Robinson was nominated, and upon a standing vote was elected. Other officers will be elected at a later meeting.

CARNEGIE GIFT AIDS EPISCOPAL PENSIONS

Appropriation Of \$324,744 To Supply Loss Of Interest On Deferred Payments
No Delay in Operating Fund—Contribution Recognizes Fact Project is First of Its Kind on Sound Actual Basis
New York, Feb. 26.—Bishop William Lawrence of Massachusetts, chairman of a committee which is raising a \$5,000,000 reserve fund with which to establish a plan for pensioning the clergy of the Protestant Episcopal church, announces that the Carnegie Corporation, "in recognition of the unique fact that the Church Pension Fund is the first of its kind to be established upon sound, actuarial principles," has appropriated \$324,744.87 to make good the loss of interest which may arise from deferred payments in the subscriptions toward the fund.
"The contributions toward the \$5,000,000 reserve are in many cases in installments, payable annually for five years," said Bishop Lawrence. "The contribution of the Carnegie Corporation is on condition that the full amount of \$3,000,000 in cash and good subscriptions shall have been shown to have been raised by March 1, 1917. Assuming that condition to have been fulfilled, the gift of the Carnegie Corporation will make it possible to put the pension scheme into immediate operation."
Although additional contributions are expected, enough money and pledges already have been received by J. Pierpont Morgan, the treasurer, to insure the success of the undertaking.
The following letter sent to Bishop Lawrence by Henry S. Pritchett of the Carnegie Corporation is made public: Dear Bishop Lawrence: With this you will receive the formal notice from the secretary of the Carnegie Corporation that at its meeting yesterday the trustees voted the amount named in your request, namely \$324,744.87 in aid of the Church Pension Fund. The trustees have taken this action not only because of their sympathy with the large body of devoted men who will in the years to come need the protection of a pension system but also for the additional reason that the pension system you propose rests upon the sound condition that a reserve be accumulated year by year from the contributions of the parishes which by actuarial computation will provide for the pensions as they may accrue. The recognition of this fundamental principle is of such importance in any pension scheme that the trustees of the corporation are glad to make this contribution to a pension plan in which it is a condition. Let me at the same time express my appreciation of the energy and devotion with which you and your associates have conducted this important enterprise. Very sincerely yours, HENRY S. PRITCHETT. The pension fund is to be continued by each parish contributing 2.5 per cent of the rector's salary annually. All annuities will amount to at least \$800. The annuity of a widow will be a minimum of \$600 provided the marriage was contracted before her husband's retirement. Certain annuities will also be provided for children until the end of their dependence.

BANK PROMOTIONS.

The Royal Bank is about to lose two very competent and popular members of its staff, Perry A. McNeill, assistant accountant, and J. Santo Domingo is the capital of the Dominican republic, in Hayti, one of the largest of the West India islands, and on that account offers fascinating possibilities for an extensive experience in banking. Mr. McNeill, who was transferred from Newcastle recently, has, by his cheerful, genial and obliging manner, made a host of friends during his short stay here, who will greatly regret his departure, while complimenting him on his well earned promotion. Mr. Currie, son of J. S. Currie of this city, is to be complimented on his advancement, after only four years' experience at banking. His cordial, pleasant and attentive bearing has attracted a large circle of friends, who, while wishing him all success in his new responsibilities, will surely miss him. They expect to leave for New York in a few days, from whence they will take the first steamer sailing for Santo Domingo, in March.

They will reside at 189 Waterloo street.
