Dr. J. L. Duval Is Wounded

Only Slightly, Says Cable to Wife—St. John Ambulance Boys Likely in First Aid Work in Great Battle

A cable received this morning by Mrs. Duval, of 116 Ludlow street, West St. John, from her husband, Major J. L. Duval, M.D., with No. 1 Field Ambulance at the front, told of his having been slightly wounded. It was dated "Hazebrouck, April 26, Slightly wounded. Writing."
Major Duval was one of the first physicians from St. John to offer his services and left here with the earliest contingent. He has been in France for several weeks, and has with him a complete ambulance detachment composed of St. John boys, with many from Fairville and West St. John. The announcement of his having been wounded would indicate that his unit was probably in the thick of the recent heavy fighting rendering first aid to the fallen in battle.

FROM DOCTOR CORREY
In a letter from Major G. G. Corbett, M. D., received this morning by his wife, he says that his base hospital at Rouen, France, was filled with wounded Canadian soldiers as a result of the recent severe fighting. He, himself, is still quite well, although working almost night and day.

"JONES IS MISSING" HE GAVE UP ALL FOR THE RIGHT
That Line in Letter From Front May Mean That Soldier Who Enlisted Here is Dead
If there was one thing more than another that Sam Jones liked to do it was fight, not the ordinary pugilistic ambition of an amateur "wilder boy," though it has been known that he could hold his own pretty well in that regard also, but fight in the uniform of a soldier, with shot and shell whistling about him. Sam had been a soldier of fortune, South African veteran, and general roustabout, hailing from Fredericton, before he signed with the king's recruiting sergeant in arms against the Kaiser. He had had a lively career into which had been crammed no end of adventure.

Now he is reported as "missing." Following the war in Africa, where Jones covered himself with glory he listed in the United States army and wore the American uniform for some years prior to his return to Fredericton. But the stillness of the capital began to weary him, and when he read that the States were organizing a force to march against the Mexicans, Sam boarded the special train, a fast freight, one dark black night and was soon across the border to Maine. But then the European bubble burst, and hearing that a contingent was being raised in Canada, the blind baggage could not carry him fast enough to St. John, where he signed the muster roll of the first contingent, and was among the other brave lads who marched from here in the lines of the first last fall. Then he was heard from again at Salisbury Plain where he was in the fore rank of those who volunteered when the call came to the 12th Infantry Battalion from this province for men to fill the gaps in other units on the firing line.

He went with the 12th Battalion to the front and has been in the thick of the fighting in Northern France, and while no official notice has yet come to hand, a letter by a Montreal soldier to his mother tells of the way Jones reported missing after wandering into a German barbed wire entanglement, and it is believed to be the same Sam who enlisted in St. John.
The letter, written by Drummer Joe Dange of the Royal Mounted, tells of the disappearance of Sam Jones in the following way:
"The last time we were in the trenches we lost eleven men wounded and killed. Sergt. Smith of the 'Vics' and a man named Sam Jones were out on a listening patrol one night, when they wandered into a German barbed wire. The Germans turned the machine gun on them. Sergt. Smith managed to get back, although with a wound in his side. Jones is missing."

ST. JOHN NOW HAS A CHIEF OF DETECTIVES

Charles Worrall, a recent acquisition to the police force this morning, assumed command of the detective force at central station. He supplants detective Fred Lusk, who was placed in charge of that department after the resignation of Patrick Killen had been accepted. Detective Worrall joined the local police department about ten days ago. He was instrumental in the Sherfield street raid a few days ago, and also active in a card playing case in Dock street.
He is to control the activities of the plain clothes men, and also to act as prosecutor in the cases brought by them before the police court.

POLICE COURT

James Hargie, arrested on Saturday night on a charge of stealing a suit of clothes, two shirts and a raincoat from Simon King, of the steamer St. George, and on suspicion of stealing one silver spoon, two knives and two blankets from the steamer, the property of the C. E. R., was remanded until tomorrow morning.
Michael Kelly was fined \$10 or four months in jail on a drunkenness charge, and also for using profane language.
One man, who was arrested for drunkenness, was remanded.
