A call at the home of Mrs. Jennie Heffernan, 6 City Road, elicited the information that her little son Eric, aged six, was taken out and beaten in the same manner place as the Hyden boy described, and was stripped and beaten the same way. The Heffernan boy was made to wear a brook up to his hips and was also made to get on his knees and promise not to divulge what had been done to him. His life also was threatened if it became known. As a result it was not till the following day or two that the nature of the beating was learned from him. He was at the time quite ill, being only out of a sick bed. He was, too, a delicate lad.
The description given by young Heffernan, tallies with that given by young Hyden, and the other children, and is taken as bearing out the police theory that it was the same person who committed these two atrocities, and also was responsible for the beating of the Donovan boy a week or more ago.

The Church in Ireland

(Montreal Star's Dublin Letter)
At a meeting of the Dublin synod of the Presbyterian church, which was held at the residence of the Rev. S. L. SEYLER'S FATE IN THE HANDS OF JURY TONIGHT

May's Landing, N. J., May 23.—Before normal William Seyler, Atlantic City, probably will know whether or not he is to die in the electric chair for murdering June Adams, the seventeen year girl, whom the commonwealth charges he threw from the pier of Atlantic city.
After endeavoring to prove to the jury that the girl was killed by Seyler while defending her honor, the state rested its case and the defense opened. Seyler was expected to take the stand today.
The theory of the defense is that June Adams was drowned accidentally, while waiting for the return of her sister, who had gone to another part of the pier, she sought shelter from the wind by stepping behind a building; that she was unacquainted with the pier and fell into the sea.
