NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—After the crew of the coastguard boat CG-126 had been declared fraternizing with and aiding rum-runners they had been set to watch, they were taken to sea in a cutter and kept in solitary confinement, chained hand and foot, and fed on rotten meat until they confessed, their captain testified, under cross-examination yesterday.


WOMAN CONVICTED

Sensation Caused at Nottingham by O. B. U. Agent

COOK REPLIES

Labor Leader Says He Did Not Know From Where the Money Came

LONDON, Jan. 8.—A sensation has been caused at Nottingham by assertions made by Tom Mace, of the One Big Union, Winnipeg, Manitoba, to C. A. Spencer, M. P., and head of the Nottingham miners, that \$12,600 which was sent by his organization to A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Federation, for the support of the British miners, has never been acknowledged or in any way accounted for.

Two Failures In N. B. This Week

TORONTO, Jan. 8.—Commercial failures in Canada in the week ending January 7, totalled 37, according to a summary issued by R. G. Dun and Company. By provinces the failures were as follows: Ontario, 13; Quebec, 10; Manitoba, 4; Alberta, 2; Saskatchewan, 3; British Columbia, 1; Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, two each.

Lynched For Theft Of Horses In Russia
