

Massachusetts Doctor Shoots Large Bear, Which Finally Escapes In Woods

Seven Cow Moose and Bull Seen in One Herd, While Smaller Groups Are Said to Be Common
—Hay Damaged

HOPEWELL HILL, Oct. 9.—Reports of the unprecedented success of the hunters in the Albert county woods continue to come in and ocular evidence is given in the large number of moose carcasses arriving in the villages every day. Never, in recent records at least, have so many moose been got so early after the opening of the season.

Quick work was done a day or two ago by a visitor from Rockport, who went in the woods one night and came out the next day with his moose. Dr. Noyes, of Massachusetts, and party secured two good-sized animals Wednesday. The doctor is having the head mounted in New Brunswick for shipment home. His party had an experience not looked for one day when they suddenly, on approaching an open space, came to close quarters with a very large bear. One of the party fired twice, the second shot knocking the big animal over. It was supposed he was done for, but to their surprise, after thrashing around and knocking a nearby stump to splinters, he moved off into the woods. It is thought possibly the shot might prove fatal. Except for a brown color about the head he was jet black and was a fine specimen of his kind.

TRAVEL 8 MONTHS TO TAKE PEEP AT SUN

Washington Observers to go to Sumatra to View January Eclipse.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—A eight months' trip half way around the world for two minutes of actual work will be the experience of a party from the Naval Observatory that has left to observe the total eclipse of the sun in January, 1926, at Sumatra, in the Dutch East Indies. British, German and French parties also will be at Sumatra, as well as a party from Swarthmore College. The Italians will have an observation party in Eastern Africa.

The American naval group will endeavor to observe phenomena in connection with the upward curve of the sun's corona as well. Motion pictures and color plates of the eclipse will be made. Special attention will be given to the sun's gases, which scientists say extend as far as two million miles from the sun's rim when the moon blots out its face.

The party will travel on the naval minesweeper Bittern from Manila to Sumatra. It expects to reach its destination soon, and the interim before the eclipse occurs, on January 14—visible only from Africa to the Indian Ocean will be spent in erecting housing and telescope tower.

Lieutenant Henry C. Kellers, a naval doctor, has been detailed to the expedition at the request of the Smithsonian Institution, to collect specimens of birds, mammals and insects. In the party are Captain Frank B. Little, professor of mathematics; G. M. Peters, associate astronomer; G. M. Raynsford, junior astronomer, and Dr. John A. Anderson, of Mount Wilson Observatory, Pasadena, Cal., physicist.

CONTEST ASSURED IN YORK-SUNBURY

Hon. D.W. Mersereau Mentioned as Likely Choice of Liberals.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 9.—Although the formal call for a Liberal nominating convention for York-Sunbury has not yet been issued, Wednesday, Oct. 14, is said to be the day. Rumor has been busy for some time connecting the names of prominent Liberals with the nomination. Among the names mentioned have been those of J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., Hon. D. W. Mersereau, former Minister of Agriculture, of the province, and R. B. Smith, ex-M. P. The anticipation is that Hon. Mr. Mersereau will be selected.

"There will be a contest, that is sure," said a prominent member of the Liberal executive today. "The Liberals of York-Sunbury are determined that there will be opposition to the Conservative nominee."

BOTH CANDIDATES START ON TOURS

CHATHAM, N. B., Oct. 9.—The political campaign in this county is now away to a good start. Both candidates, assisted by able lieutenants have commenced their tours and the campaign promises to be a lively one. It is said that James Robinson, of Millerton will contest the county as an independent candidate and in this event the outcome of the election on Oct. 29 will attract much interest.

The first meeting in the Liberal interests was held at Black River River Tuesday night, when the electors were addressed by the candidate F. W. Cassidy. J. K. Loggie and F. W. Cassidy.

Wednesday's heard addresses on the issues of the campaign from the candidate, W. P. Cassidy and others. The Conservative candidate, Charles Fish, in opening his campaign in the upriver districts.

CONDEMNNS MEIGHEN FREIGHT RATE PLAN

JACKSONVILLE, N. B., Oct. 9.—The hall here was crowded last Monday when T. W. Caldwell, who is seeking federal honors, addressed the electors. He criticized the suggestions of Hon. Arthur Meighen, that freight rates should be adjusted by payments from the public treasury. Such a thing, he said, would be unconstitutional and Parliament would not vote for it.

Continuing, he said that high tariffs would not give employment to the Canadian people, but would enable men to become wealthy. He dealt with the debt of the Dominion and said that Mr. Meighen's suggestion for economy had come six years too late. When in power Mr. Meighen would have had an opportunity to do something. However, he appeared to practice economy only when in opposition, Mr. Caldwell said.

Gordon Sharp also spoke and told of what Mr. Caldwell had done while a member of the Federal House.

Bangor Man Is Shot By Masked Bandit

BANGOR, Me., Oct. 9.—Harry Clay, 45, manager of a filling station on State street, in the residential section, was shot and it is believed fatally wounded by a masked bandit who entered the place about 10 o'clock tonight and ordered him to hold up his hands.

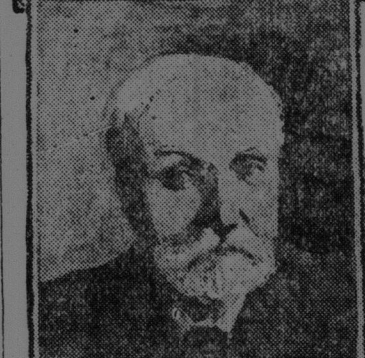

N. S. BOY, 10, SENT UP ON MURDER CHARGE

Guysboro Lad to Stand Trial For Shooting Playmate With Gun.

GUYSBORO, N. S., Oct. 9.—Philip Clyde, aged 10, appeared before Stipendiary Desbarres here today charged with causing the death of his playmate Earl Skinner, also aged 10, by shooting him with a shotgun at the Clyde home, near here, last Saturday afternoon. After a brief hearing the lad was committed to stand trial. Evidence given at the coroner's inquest into the cause of the Skinner boy's death was the effect that Earl Skinner, the brother, Wilfrid, and Philip Clyde were engaged in play at the Clyde home when Philip got hold of a shotgun and fired at Earl Skinner, blowing the back of his head off and killing him almost instantly.

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Receipts For Licenses For Motor Vehicles Are More Than \$500,000 in N. B.

FREDERICTON, N.B., Oct. 9.—Motor vehicle license fees receipts at the provincial Department of Public Works have already passed the half million dollar mark and the fiscal year will not close until the end of October.

Last year's receipts from auto fees reached \$452,499.32, which was a new record. Ex-Premier Veniot's estimate was \$500,000 for the present year and was presented to the Legislature. Five years ago receipts were less than \$200,000, while ten years ago—in 1915—the total receipts were \$23,146 and in 1910 the amount was less than \$1,000—\$763 to be exact. The numbers of cars licensed in N. B. this year is over \$20,000 and the registrations show many new cars sold this year. Last year there were 18,310 cars and 1,448 trucks licensed.

Dies After Fall Into Hold of Steamer

CHATHAM, N. B., Oct. 9.—Karl F. Olsen, second mate of the Norwegian steamer Frednes, died at the Hotel Dies Hospital last evening, following injuries received last Saturday. He was buried here today.

Olsen while superintending the loading of laths in the vessel was knocked into the hold and sustained a fractured skull as well as internal injuries. He was unconscious from the time of his injury until his death. The body was interred in Riverside cemetery, the services being conducted by J. H. A. Anderson. The steamer left today for New York.

Organizer Suing For \$25,000 Balm

Mr. Smith has taken samples of coal from every corporation colliery in Cape Breton for the purpose of making comparison and to determine the quality of the grade for use in the firebox of the Canadian National Railway locomotives.

Wolves and Coyotes Ravage Settlers

SAULT STE MARIE, Ont. Oct. 9.—Wolves and coyotes are again ravaging the Bar River settlers this fall and no less than 10 to sheep have been killed by wolves in the last 10 days.

As a result of the depredations of wolves this fall many of the farmers around Bar River have either sold or anticipate selling their remaining sheep.
