

DEATH TOLL IN NEW YORK FIRE NOW FIFTEEN

Aged Woman Succumbs to Burns Received

Drug Addict Seized and Sent to Bellevue—Two Bodies in Morgue Identified.

New York, Oct. 26.—The list of dead in the fire at 110th Street and Lexington Avenue Sunday in which fourteen persons were reported to have lost their lives, was increased to fifteen when Mrs. Rose Ingles, 83, died of burns and the inhalation of smoke. Her daughter was burned to death in the fire. The two unidentified bodies at the Morgue were identified as those of Gerald B. Sugarman, 24, a violinist, and his sister, Marie Sugarman, 24, a stenographer. Five brothers and sisters in the Sugarman family and the husband of one of the sisters were burned to death.

Funds for the relief of sufferers from the fire are being raised, although a committee was only organized yesterday. Martin J. Kennedy, of 46 Dey Street, is chairman, and the Yorkville Bank, Eighty-fifth Street and Third

No one was injured in the derailment.

WOMEN PREVENT TRAIN WRECK

Timely Warning Saves Vermont Passenger Train from Collision.

Lebanon, Conn., Oct. 26.—The combined efforts of two women prevented a wreck on the Central Vermont Railroad in the town of Franklin and saved about 150 passengers from possible injury. Mrs. E. M. Troland, telephone operator here, received a call for aid from a telegraph operator of the railroad at Yantic, who reported that a northbound passenger train was on its way to Lebanon and a locomotive was running south on the single track, and they would probably come together in Franklin unless something was done.

Mrs. Troland pushed a plug into the switchboard and a telephone bell rang in the Murphy farmhouse in Franklin. Mrs. William Murphy answered the call. In a few moments she was on her way with her daughter to the railroad tracks nearby. The engineer of the lone locomotive headed the waving of her apron and stopper. Then he backed the engine, blowing the whistle meanwhile as a warning to the passenger train.

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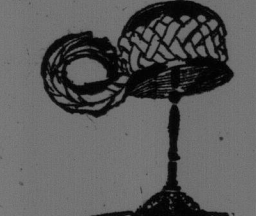
