### SKATING.

Gorman Night at Arena.

The series of races held in the Arena were brought to a close last evening. The events skated were the senior and junior half mile. Murphy Knocked Out.  
New York, Jan. 31.—Paul Doyle, Brooklyn, knocked out Frankie Murphy of Denver in the fifth round of a scheduled 12 round bout.

Greb Retains Title.  
New York, Jan. 31.—Harry Greb, of Pittsburgh light heavyweight champion of the United States, defended his title in a fifteen round bout with Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia at Madison Square Garden last night. Both weighed 160 pounds.

Loughran was a defensive puzzle in the first round and in the second he pocketed several stiff lefts to the champion's face. The challenger added a few more in the third while Greb pruned wildly swinging effectively. They exchanged more evenly during short rallies in the fourth. Greb landed two hard right jabs during the quiet fifth but was cautioned to stop butting with his head. Both men tried unsuccessfully for an opening in the sixth.

Greb remained baffled and Loughran was generally on the defensive in the seventh, but in the eighth the champion quickened the pace finding the challenger willing to exchange. Greb had the edge of some loose fighting in the ninth.

In any event, he said, he would go to the early Spring training camp at Marlin, Texas, and there take up his demands if the matter were not adjusted meantime.

Brick Owens Signs.  
Chicago, January 31.—Clarence B. ("Brick") Owens, one of the best known umpires in the American League, has signed his 1923 contract with President Ban Johnson. Owens, who has just left the hospital after an illness caused by intestinal disorder, will begin his ninth year of service as an American League umpire in April.
