

## CANADA'S BUILDING AT THE BRITISH EMPIRE EXHIBITION



The British Empire exhibition which is to be held next year between April and October at Wembley, near London, England, is expected to attract at least twenty million visitors. Nothing used in the construction but will be produced within the Empire. Only the Dominions and other parts of the Empire will be exhibitors. Canada will erect a building of which this sketch shows the architectural design. The government is to spend a million dollars on the exhibition. The two Canadian transcontinental railways are also erecting buildings.

## LORD ROBERT CECIL IN AMERICA

Herbert S. Houston, publisher of Our World, pays a tribute to the magazine for May, just issued, to the personality of Lord Robert Cecil, the British spokesman of the League of Nations, who has been touring the United States. Mr. Houston says: "Never before has a more engaging envoy of understanding come to this country from abroad than Lord Robert Cecil. His disarming candor in conferring the weaknesses of the League, whose cause he came to advocate, has

strengthened the modest claims he has made for its accomplishments. "But even more than his candor or than his temperate fairness, was the deep ardor of his conviction. This shone through the man, as it did always through Lincoln. Instantly people were commenting on this similarity to our 'first American.' Editors all over the country referred to it. "His advocacy of the League, throughout, has been more in the form of interpretation of the Covenant and of the workings of the League than of argument. And this has been the kind of advocacy the country has needed. It has riddled the fallacy of the 'super-state' more completely than any number of polemical batteries could possibly have done. . . . People and newspapers, who differed from him strongly on the League, were won to a new attitude of tolerance, and in very many cases this resulted in a decision to re-survey the whole question. "The emergency kit of the Red Cross Society was again called into service yesterday when a cut finger was dressed at the depot in Prince William street. It is doing valuable work."



## BRITAIN TO SEND 20,000 TO U. S. BEFORE JUNE 30

Quota of 77,342 immigrants still unfilled despite report to contrary.

London, April 10.—(By mail)—Between now and the end of June 20,000 emigrants will leave Great Britain for the United States, reports The London Daily Mail.

The number of British immigrants who will be accepted by the United States for the current fiscal year (ending June 30) was restricted to 77,342. Only 58,000 have actually crossed the Atlantic.

The North Atlantic Passenger Conference (the association of shipping companies) announces that the full quota has been completed by recent bookings and that consequently no more persons will be taken as emigrants until July. This statement has apparently been misunderstood by the American authorities.

A dispatch from Washington stated that although 22,000 more immigrants were still to come, the British Foreign Office was withholding passports.

"That is incorrect," a Foreign Office official said. "There is no restriction

whatever on passports. We are only too pleased to furnish people with passports, but whether they will be able to obtain the American visa is a matter for the American Consuls. Visitors on business or pleasure, students and theatrical performers are not included in the quota.

## ITS POPULATION LESS.

Labrador Has Lost Steadily Since 1884—Newfoundland Gains.

Newfoundland and Labrador's latest population figures, which have just been completed, show a total of 262,979, which compares favorably with the census of 1911, when the total was 242,619, an increase of 20,360 or 8.39 per cent. Of this total 259,598 represent the population of Newfoundland, and 3,381 Labrador, as against 238,670 and 3,949, respectively, in 1911. A gradual increase in population since the official census of 1857 is shown by the report. In that year the population was only 124,268. In 1874 it had increased to 161,374; 1901, to 220,584, and 1911, to 242,619.

"Lack of development in Labrador has been the cause of a steady loss of population since 1884, when the total population was 4,211," states a bulletin of the Canadian Pacific Railway. "Figures for each succeeding ten-year period show a slight decline, and the 1922 census returns record a falling off of 328 from the last report issued in 1911. There was no immigration to Labrador between 1911 and 1921, while there was a loss of forty-seven due to emigration. The natural increase in population shows a decline of 281, leaving a net loss to the territory of 328 persons."

"An analysis of the census report

shows that while the figures regarding nationality have not yet been checked, there would appear to be 262,478 persons either born or naturalized British subjects in Labrador and Newfoundland and only 504 persons of other nationalities."

Montreal, May 12.—Up to an early hour this morning no trace had been found of the murderers of J. B. Roy, night watchman for the Perrin Kayser Co., who was shot through the heart by burglars in the office of the company in Sunday night.

## HOW JOHN D. RYAN ESCAPED FROM A BORE

The acquaintance from Washington left them before they arrived in New York. After he had gone, the bore with the international reputation was silent for a while and then exploded: "How on earth can you stand that fellow? He talks all the time!"


